From the Rector

Dear Friends,

It is said that when one is busy time seems to go faster. I think that is true and right now around our church time is flying! We have started our stewardship campaign. On November 2nd we have our All Souls' Day service at 11 am in the Memorial Garden. On November 10th we have our Veterans' Day luncheon when we celebrate and honor our veterans and celebrate God's provision for us at the conclusion of our stewardship campaign. On Thanksgiving Day, the 28th, we will have our Rite One service. In the midst of all that we will be having our regular ministries; the Bible studies and youth group, the Thrift Store, Back-packs and Food Pantry, the Adult Formation, choir, and Altar Guild. So November will be an exciting month in the life of our church! November is also a time for us to consciously choose to be thankful. We have one day in the year when as a nation and especially as Christians we stop and remember God's blessings to us. I find the story of Martin Rinkart always inspiring. Rinkart was a minister in Germany some 350 years ago. He was the son of a poor coppersmith, but somehow, he managed to work his way through an education. Finally, in the year 1617, he was offered the post of minister in his hometown parish in Eilenburg. A year later, what has come to be known as the Thirty-Years-War broke out. His town, Eilenburg, was caught right in the middle of the opposing factions. In 1637, the massive plague that swept across the continent of Europe hit Eilenburg. People died at the rate of fifty a day and the man called upon to bury most of them was Martin Rinkart. In one year alone, Pastor Rinkart conducted funerals for 4,500 people, including his own beloved wife. His labors finally came to an end about 11 years later, just one year after the conclusion of the war. His ministry spanned 32 years, all but the first and the last overwhelmed

by the great conflict that engulfed his town. These were very tough circumstances in which to be thankful. But read the words he wrote: "Now thank we all our God, with hearts and hands and voices, Who wondrous things hath done, In whom the world rejoices ...[So] keep us in His grace, and guide us when perplexed, and free us from all ills, in this world and the next. "(Unfortunately we no longer have this hymn in our hymnal but you can look it up on-line if you wish to read the rest of the words—it is a wonderful hymn.) It is incredible isn't it? Even when he was waist deep in destruction and grief, Pastor Rinkart was able to lift his sights to a higher plane. He kept his mind on God's love when the world was filled with hate. He kept his mind on God's promises of heaven when the earth was a living hell. Sometimes it is not be easy to be thankful. Yet, it is only through trusting in our God and being thankful that we will be able to find joy and peace in our lives. So let each of us make the time to be thankful to God no matter what circumstances in which we find ourselves.

Ministry News

Altar Guild

Dear Friends of St. Andrew's,

Welcome to the November Chimes and the beginning of many special days to come! As you know, the Altar Guild works behind the scenes in a variety of ways and one of these is to prepare the Altar to celebrate the Holy Eucharist. Each item used in the preparation and set up of the Holy Eucharist has a specific name and purpose. When we learn the proper name of an item and its use, we are able to communicate about it better with each other. We are all familiar with a Chalice. The purificator is folded in thirds and draped over the Chalice. It is used to wipe the Chalice after each communicate partakes of the wine and also to keep the wine from dripping on the altar cloth, called the Fair Linen. If consecrated wine is spilled at any time, a purificator is used to clean it up.

When the Chalice is placed on the altar before the service begins, it is fully vested. The steps for vesting the Chalice are as follows: A purificator is always placed directly over the Chalice with the end thirds hanging over each side of the Chalice. The Chalice is placed on a corporal on the Altar. The Corporal is the square linen that is placed under the Chalice on the Altar and under the elements (wine and hosts) in the Narthex. The Paten (a small plate used to hold the priest's host) is placed over the Purificator and a priest's host is placed on the paten. Next is the pall, a flat, rigid square to protect the priest's host. The veil (which is the proper color) is draped over the pall with the cross facing the congregation. Finally, the Burse (a larger square that matches the frontal and lectern) is placed on top of the veil. The Burse opens and contains two extra purificators in case of spills etc.

Watch as the celebrant removes these items before communion. The Burse, Veil and Pall will be set aside and moved

to the Credence Table.

Vesting the Chalice for each service is just one of the many responsibilities of the Altar Guild. There are many opportunities to serve St. Andrew's Church, please consider this ministry to share your talents.

The Pastoral Care Ministry is dedicated to bringing the presence of Christ to parishioners that are unable to come to regular services either on a temporary or on-going basis.

Many of our members are licensed Lay Eucharistic visitors and bring communion. Some of our members also belong to the Order of Saint Luke and pray and anoint for healing. However, it is not necessary to be or do either. Our goal is to bring the presence of Christ and the caring of our congregation to our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. Many of the visits can consist of a short friendly visit bringing bulletins, newsletters, cards and small gifts, prayer and or reading Bible passages if the parishioner is unable to do so.

As I mentioned in previous issues, during the past year we were happy to welcome three new members: Karen Risley, Vera Scharf and Nancy Skinner.

The third new member of the Pastoral Care Team is Vera Scharf. Vera was born in England during WW2 and grew up in the postwar years. She feels she was drawn to the healing field, in part due to a very caring Sunday School teacher who taught her all the wonderful stories of Jesus. As a very young child she announced her desire to be a nurse, never changed her mind, and achieved her goal of becoming a Registered Nurse. Having a license that would allow her to work in many different countries, she got itchy feet and set off to see this beautiful world. The first stop was Canada where she arrived with a small suitcase and \$60 in her

purse! Being a nurse she immediately found employment.

She lived in Canada for twelve years, married, and had two children. Then her husband got interested in adventure so they immigrated in 1977 to the USA, to Fort Myers, Fl. Five years later they became American Citizens. Life was full and good until her husband died in a small plane accident in 1990.

Vera learned how much she needed God. They were members of an Episcopal church and she is still grateful to her brothers and sisters at that church who prayed for her at a time when she was so numb that she was unable to pray for herself. At this point Vera really began to grow spiritually, and become aware of God working in her life and the awesome power of prayer, personal and intercessory.

In 2001 Father Fred and Vera were married and moved to Hudson. A few years ago they joined St Andrews Church and are very happy here as they continue to learn and grow spiritually. Both are members of the Order of St Luke and Cursillo. Vera is a lay reader and active Daughter of the King. She wasn't looking to join anything else but, about a year ago, she started feeling little nudges that she should become part of the Pastoral Care Ministry. And then a bigger nudge, "What are you waiting for?" Vera is so grateful that she obeyed this call. She feels that this is an awesome ministry for her. In her words "It is such a privilege to visit those who are sick or injured and to share God's love with them. We are so vulnerable when we are sick, possibly away from our families, sometimes lonely, and frequently scared. It is such a blessing for me, to be able to share Jesus with others as we talk, pray and share Communion together."

"I am blessed to be a part of St Andrew's and blessed to be part of several ministries, especially the Pastoral Care Ministry. I thank you Lord."

Our next meeting is will be November 20, since our usual Wednesday meeting falls the week of Thanksgiving.

Reminder: we cannot visit you or your loved one if we do not know you need a visit. The laws and guidelines are very strict and facilities cannot let us know if you are there or not. You or a family member or friend must call the office and let us know. The office staff is very conscientious about

letting Father Lance and me know.



The distances we would be able to drive will be to places around Spring Hill, over to Brooksville, and down as far south as Bayonet Point Hospital. People who need rides must be able to get in and out of a car with minimal assistance. This ride service would be for our parishioners but not for their pets. We would also like to offer rides to church if there are folks who would be willing to pick someone up on their way to church. If you would be willing to assist in this particular ministry either by volunteering for a half-day or to bring someone to church, please let Fr. Lance know.
