Dear People of St. Andrew's,

When I was in 7th Grade, my prealgebra teacher kept an "Oh!" meter on one of her bulletin boards for the duration of the year. It looked like one of those old-school thermometers with blocks



that could be shaded. The idea was that the "Oh!" meter would a testament to our learning throughout the year.

As anyone who has been subjected to taking pre-algebra knows, attempting to solve quadratic equations is like uncovering a mystery wrapped in a conundrum! Every time someone asked our teacher a question, she would patiently endeavor to help us understand the problem. Eventually, there was usually a breakthrough moment when a student would understand how to answer the question. This was usually accompanied by the student exclaiming, "Oh!" in the classroom. My teacher would then invite the student to go shade in the next block on that section's "Oh!" meter. By the end of the year, the meters for each of the sections of her class were shaded nearly to the top. It was clear that we had learned a lot during the year.

Epiphany, and the season which follows, are a celebration of "Oh!" moments. This is a time of year, we hear accounts of breakthroughs in which people recognize Jesus as being more than an ordinary human being. The principal Epiphany moments include:

- The Manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ to the Gentiles, represented by the visit of the Magi: The Wise Men come to visit Jesus from the East. Theirs is an encounter of people from another culture embracing Jesus for the special person he is. They bring gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, each representing aspects of Jesus' kingship, divinity, and passion.
- The Baptism of Jesus: In the Eastern Church, this is the emphasis of Epiphany, which we celebrate on the

Sunday following January 6 in the modern Western liturgical calendar. This is one of the moments when the divinity of Jesus is recognized with a voice from the heavens. The baptism marks Jesus' acceptance of his calling and the beginning of his ministry of teaching, healing, and sacrifice.

• The Transfiguration: We actually observe this event twice over the course of the year. There is the traditional Feast of the Transfiguration which occurs in the summertime on August 6. We will also hear the account of the Transfiguration in a few weeks on the Last Sunday after the Epiphany. When we hear it this time of year, it acts as a transition from Epiphany into Lent, along with the promise of Easter to come. Like the Baptism of Jesus, this is another moment where a voice comes from the heavens to mark that Jesus is set apart, different.

While these are the principal Epiphany events, it is possible to see this theme play out to a lesser extent in the readings which will occur on the other Sundays of this season. They all serve as a reminder that Jesus, fully human and fully divine, has a special place and purpose in the world. These are accounts of the People of God having "Oh!" moments where they recognize this truth, laid down in the foundation of the world.

Where have you experienced an "Oh!" moment? Where has God made a breakthrough in your life? I believe each of us has the momentary glimpses where God inspires us and confirms us in our various callings as his disciples. These too are Epiphanies. These are the moments we recognize God is present and real to us. The task for us is to pay attention so these times do not pass us without our notice. Each of us has the opportunities to exclaim "Oh! God is here!" and to shade another block on our own personal "Oh!" meter.



- cess. Seal only with the adhesive on the envelope. Your contribution is perfectly safe by just doing that.
- 2. If you miss a week or month, you do not have to give your contribution in those missed weeks' envelopes. One check or cash to cover your missed time is sufficient.
- 3. Before putting your check in the envelope, please make sure it is made out to St. Andrew's, the written line is legible and matches the number amount of the check and that your check is signed. I'm sorry to say that we had some trouble with this during 2024.
- 4. What you give to the church is only known by me as the Treasurer and the person who helps me with inputting your contribution into the database. Once we finish with the offerings for the week, what we may have seen is forgotten. And the counters are only concerned with balancing out what they've counted.

The 2025 Budget will be presented during the Annual Meeting at the end of January. Copies of the budget (which will have been approved by the vestry) will be available to you the weekend before the Annual Meeting. If you have seen the Status of the 2025 Budget thermometer in the narthex, you know that the budget presented will most likely not be a balanced budget. If you have not yet turned in a pledge card and plan to make a pledge, please do so at your earliest convenience.
