Dear People of St. Andrew's,

The past 20 years have seen a revolution in how we communicate information with one another. We have witnessed the widespread adoption of the internet by people of all ages and walks of life. At first, the internet was an additional



channel of quick connection. It has now supplanted many of the traditional avenues for sharing important material. In 2025, I have multiple apps on my iPhone that will alert me with "Breaking News." At the same time, I rarely pick up a hard copy newspaper anymore.

The shifts in communication going on in corporate media are being replicated in the church. Once upon a time, our diocese sent out a monthly newspaper entitled "The Southern Cross." The first edition of that publication came out in 1970, shortly after the establishment of the diocese. As electronic communication became more common, it morphed into a quarterly magazine in 2014. You may have noticed that you have not received a copy since October 2022. When Bishop Scharf became our diocesan bishop, he directed that the resources devoted to "The Southern Cross" be invested in creating an excellent web presence along with improving the quality of the bi-weekly "Bridges" email as an organ for sharing the Good News from across the diocese.

The shift that has occurred in diocesan communication has been mirrored in most parishes. Churches that once published monthly newsletters realized that savings in printing and postage could be realized through online distribution of those newsletters as pdf files. Increasingly, parishes began to see online platforms as the primary means of communication. Printed communications often contained outdated material as last-minute changes became necessary. Electronic newsletters are able to convey important data on short notice. It also allows people from beyond the parish who may be interested in us to get a better glimpse of what life is like at St. Andrew's.

We are somewhat unique in that we continue to have a hard copy monthly newsletter (even if many of you are reading this in electronic form). Most churches sunsetted their monthly newsletters some years ago or reduced them to seasonal publications. They generally report the change to be positive.

I know many of you value receiving the "Chimes" as a way to stay connected with what is happening at St. Andrew's. That sense of connection is important. That said, I believe it is important for us to invest our resources in the ways most of us communicate. Whether it is our church or our grandchildren, most of us are now communicating electronically. I want to follow the path of our diocese and most parishes in creating a quality online communication experience through the "e-Chimes."

It is customary for the printed "Chimes" newsletter to go on recess over the summer months. It seems that this is an appropriate point to make the adjustment that has occurred in most other parishes and dedicate our time and energy in the parish office into the electronic newsletter. While it is not my intention to fully eliminate this newsletter in the fall, we will be producing it less frequently than in the past. It will probably take on a different style. It will be less about current events and increasingly a platform to tell out stories. It is my hope that many of the things we currently do through the "Chimes" will be integrated into the "eChimes."

I realize this represents a major change and a mindset shift in how we communicate. I know many of you look forward to the arrival of this publication. Please know that we want everyone to stay informed. The good news is that the e-newsletter arrives much more frequently. The information is up-to-date and in an electronic-friendly format. If you have important details share, please let Lisa know in the church office so it can be included.

We give thanks for those who have made the printed Chimes a valued source of information for St. Andrew's through the years. As we find new ways to tell our stories, we are reminded that we follow in the footsteps of those who were effective in spreading the Gospel using the tools of their day.
