An Ancient Faith for a Modern World

Dear People of St. Andrew's, Back in 2011, I heard a memorable sermon by the Rt. Rev. Duncan Gray, III, who was serving as Bishop of Mississippi, a diocese which covers the entire state. In the sermon he made a

statement that encapsulated the challenge of the church in our times, "There is a spiritual hunger in this country that is unprecedented, even as the institutional church is seen as a non-option for growing numbers of spiritually hungry young adults. Old models of being the church are increasingly ineffective in being the

bearers of the Gospel to this hungry and despairing world." The only thing that has changed between the time I heard Bishop Gray preach this sermon and now is that it is only truer today. I heard someone else sum things up when he said, "I love Jesus. I just wish he wouldn't bring his leprous bride every place he goes."

We live in an age where we are suspicious of institutions. We are acutely aware of scandals that have eroded trust

in government, media, and even sports. This feeling extends to the institutional church. We are long gone from the days when then-Presiding Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill appeared on the cover of the March 26, 1951 cover of Time magazine leading a Protestant America like Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt.

We Episcopalians built a large institution in the 20th Century. In the 1890s, the Episcopal Church constructed a headquarters in the Gramercy Park neighborhood in New York. We underwent a major reorganization in 1919 that gave us much of the structure we know today. In 1963, the headquarters moved to an office tower in Midtown Manhattan, located be-



tween Grand Central Terminal and the United Nations. The church replicated the mid-century patterns one might see in an organization like General Motors. It served us well. It was the incubator that helped birth St. Andrew's as a new church start with 7 buildings on almost 7 acres of land.

The problem is the world has moved onward. Our current Presiding Bishop, Sean Rowe, has noted that the economic boom of the 1990s kept us blind to the changes which were afoot in society. Meanwhile, we continued to operate in the same way. It was only with the Great Recession at the end of the first decade of the 2000s that we started to take the change seri-


ously, even if our response was halting and often filled with denial.

We have moved from an age of the GM Mark of Excellence to an age of moving fast and breaking things. This is not something we do well as Episcopalians. Our institutional structures may no longer serve us well, but they have shaped our worldview. It is like trying to explain to a fish that it is wet.

While the "move fast and break things" metaphor is one that comes from the tech

industry, there are ways this is happening in the wider church beyond our own tradition. I consider myself blessed to be an Episcopalian, but there are things we can learn from our brothers and sisters in Christ in nondenominational circles. I am not suggesting that every Episcopal parish needs a worship band and a fancy lighting system. What makes many of these more recent church starts successful is that they are unburned by history and inflexible institutional norms. They can adapt far more easily than we can.

There are pieces of our institutional legacy that are very important! I think we need to lift up the core parts of who we are, to focus on the basics like inten-



tional liturgy, sound formation, generous outreach, and excellent fellowship. These things will not be done the way we did them in decades past. We need to keep the essentials while discarding those things which have outlived their purpose. We still need institutions, but the institution needs to meet the current mission.

In some ways, I am more hopeful about the future of the Episcopal Church than I have been at any point since I was ordained to the priesthood in 2008. I must admit there have been times that I thought I was the manager of a local Kmart or Blockbuster Video. As I told a friend from my college days who lives in very unchurched Seattle, I am excited because I think the church is finally beginning to have the conversations we should have started 20 years ago. I see it in the leadership of our new Presiding Bishop on a churchwide level and closer to home in the leadership Bishop Scharf is giving in our diocese. I am realizing that this is also part of my call as your relatively new rector at St. Andrew's. At all levels of the church, we are figuring out how to adapt our structure to meet our mission.

This is not to say that the conversations and adjustments which unfold will be easy. As leadership expert Ronald Heifetz wrote, "People do not resist change but fear loss." I am reminded that Jesus gave us the brief parable about how a grain of wheat must die to bear fruit. The future will, indeed, look different.

As we seek to adapt, mistakes will be made and failure will happen. (At St. Andrew's, I will be responsible for many of them!) The challenge before us to meet the current moment with grace, while continuing to be guided by the values we proclaim as disciples of Jesus who called us to proclaim the Good News.


Enjoy a lunch of grilled hot dogs, chips, and a drink for \$5.

Lenten Practices

For nearly two thousand years the 40-day season of Lent has been used by God's people to remember the events of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Christians throughout the ages have chosen to take on disciplines to keep them centered on God all the way to Easter. We encourage you to take on these daily spiritual practices as well, which can help protect from distraction and increase our ability to hear from God. May we all be transformed as we participate in these exercises of grace.

Monday: Make no purchases Most of us can buy things whenever we need them. Take a day to fast purchases. Examples: Make your lunch instead of buying it. Plan to fill your tank of gas on another day. Avoid the vending machine. As you do, pray for those who go without.

Tuesday: Make a personal contact Our lives can be so busy. Many of us are in such a rush that we don't have time for relationships. Examples: Write and send a hand-written note. Make a phone call to an old friend. Have people over for a meal. As you do, encourage them in the Lord or thank them for their influence in your life.

Wednesday: Fast noise For many of us, we are constantly barraged with noise from our T.V. radio, or iPod. Our lives are also bombarded with distractions through social media and advertisement. Embrace silence so that God's voice may be loud in your life. Examples: Turn off your car radio. Take a break from social media. Keep the television off today. As you do, sing a worship song, or speak out your prayers, and listen for God's still small voice.

Thursday: Add an extra hour of sleep We are designed to need sleep. Rest is one of the greatest gi s God gives us. Some of us are exhausted from burning the candle at both ends. Be thankful for God's goodness by going to bed an hour early. If you can't sleep, lie in bed and read the scriptures or pray for the needs of others.

Friday: Fast a food of your choice It is easy to become addicted to sweets, caffeine, and constant eating. Recognize your dependence on God, and be thankful for the things you enjoy by choosing to fast a meal or a food of choice. As you do, focus on your dependence on God for your most basic needs.

Saturday: Add an hour of physical activity When we take care of our bodies we take care of the temple of the Holy Spirit. Examples: Go for a walk. Visit the Family Life Center. Swim a few laps at the YMCA. As you do, pray for those who are suffering from disease or sickness, and thank God for the gift of life and the health you have.

Sunday: Celebrate in worship! Participate with the community in the 8:00 or 10:30 worship service.






Women's Bible Study will not meet on March 6 and 13.


