The Tool Kit

A **Lightning Strike** damaged the school computer system, the fire alarm monitoring system in Krysher Hall, the office and Sanctuary alarm systems, and the bell tower electronic control system. Our insurance company has been contacted and a claim filed to recover the expenses incurred in repairing and replacing the damaged systems and components. The school computers are back up and running. The Krysher Hall, office and Sanctuary systems will be repaired by the time you read this. The extent of damage and necessary repairs to the bell tower are under analysis and a solution is anticipated shortly.

Thrift Shop Lavatory: Significant damage was discovered in the Thrift Shop's ladies room. Faulty toilet seals and seeping plumbing fixtures caused serious water damage to one wall as well as the tile baseboard. Repairs to the plumbing fixtures and replacement of the damaged wall sections are underway along with modifications to provide wheel chair access. The remainder of the ladies room will receive fresh paint on the walls and ceiling at this time as well.

Krysher Hall: Both gable ends of Krysher Hall have needed repair for some time. The T-111 siding has buckled in a number of spots due to inadequate fastening techniques used at the time of construction. Damage was also noted to some of the fascia boards and soffit areas. Work to correct these deficiencies will be underway shortly. The T-111 siding will be removed to allow the installation of horizontal battens to provide proper surfaces for the correct fastening of the siding. New siding will be installed only where necessary.

The current material will be reused wherever possible. New fascia boards

will replace those currently installed where required and will then be covered with aluminum facing. New vented soffit material will replace the present non-vented material. Painting will be done with Sherwin-Williams "Emerald" lifetime warranty latex coating.

Sanctuary & Office: The Sanctuary and office buildings will be painted with the same Sherwin-Williams "Emerald" lifetime warranty material after proper preparation and repair or replacement of any damaged wood components including fascia and soffit areas, as well as installing vents in the soffits of the Adam & Eve, Youth & Usher buildings. Water damaged doors in the bath and storage buildings will be repaired at the same time.

Perimeter Shrubs: A decision was reached at the October vestry meeting to trim the perimeter shrubs down to a more manageable 3' height. This will provide a more open and welcoming appearance to our church while maintaining a clear and definitive border to our campus. This project will be done in mid-January, 2013 in accordance with the recommendations of our landscape professionals.

The Library held its first meeting October 9 since adjourning for summer break. We have new donated used books for your enjoyment. Just remember there is a limit of two weeks to read your book, and no late fees. Come in Sunday or during the week when Krysher Hall is open to browse and find a good book to read: pull the card from the back of the book, sign and date it, and place it on the desk: it's that easy.

The Book Club also met October 9 and enjoyed Joanne Lillpopp's review of *Caleb's Crossing*. Not all of us had a chance to read the book prior to the meeting, but it tweaked our interest to read it later. **Tuesday November 13** the book for review is *The Paris Wife: A Novel* by Paula McLain. All who would like to join a great group of people please come on the second Tuesday of each month. The Library

meets 12:30 to 1:30 and Book Club is 1:30 to 2:45—join both or just one, I promise you good fellowship and lots of laughter. Happy Reading! — *Deb Wilks*

As far as the rest of our **Wish List** is concerned, we still could use the following items:


- 2 Tricycles





The Apocrypha

! Our sincere thanks to Deacon Ludwig for continuing to send us such interesting & informative contributions!

There are books of the Jewish Bible which were not considered important enough to be included in the Old Testament. Depending on which bible you read, you may or may not find these books listed.

This set of sacred scrolls is known as the *Apocrypha*. The word Apocrypha in Greek means “hidden.” This set of books was written between 300 BC and 70 AD and they weren’t considered reliable enough for inclusion in the Jewish Bible.

Like the Old Testament, the Apocrypha covers the areas of history, prayer, romance, poems, songs and wise sayings.

There is no agreement among the world’s religions as to how many (if any), or which ones belong in the Apocrypha; for example: the Roman Catholic Church includes seven books in their bible, most Protestant bibles have dropped the entire section, and the Eastern Orthodox Church uses the entire Apocrypha.

The books included in the Apocrypha are:

| <p>Tobit: The story about a Jewish man deported to Nineveh (present day Iraq). Here he gives executed Jews a proper burial even though it was against Assyrian Law.</p> | <p>Letter of Jeremiah: Letters written to the Jewish exiled in Babylon, warning them not to worship idols.</p> | <p>1 Esdras: Tells the story of the fall of Jerusalem, the Jews in exile in Babylon, the Jews returning home, and the rebuilding of the temple.</p> |
| <p>Judith: The story of how a Jewish widow, Judith, saves her city from attacking Assyrians.</p> | <p>The Prayer of Azariah and the Song of the Three Jews: This is an add-on to the Book of Daniel and is said to be the song and prayer that Daniel’s three friends prayed as Nebuchadnezzar had them thrown into the fiery furnace.</p> | <p>Prayer of Manasseh: This is a 15-verse prayer from King Manasseh, the most evil Jewish king, confessing his sins.</p> |
| <p>Esther additions: This Greek version of Esther’s story adds 107 extra verses and over 50 references to God. The Hebrew version doesn’t mention God at all.</p> | <p>Susanna: The story of a beautiful Jewish woman who is accused of having sex with a stranger. Daniel proves the woman’s accusers wrong.</p> | <p>Psalms 151: This was David’s song after he killed Goliath.</p> |
| <p>Wisdom of Solomon: A collection of wise sayings and essays designed to help people live righteous lives.</p> | <p>Bel and the Dragon: This is the story of Daniel exposing the hoaxes about two false gods.</p> | <p>3 Maccabees: A story about God’s protection of Jews from a King in Egypt who attempts to kill the Jews by having elephants trample them to death.</p> |
| <p>Sirach: This 51-chapter book is also known as “Ecclesiasticus.” It features songs and wise advice.</p> | <p>1 Maccabees: Story of a Jewish priest leading a revolt against the Syrians to secure Israel’s independence.</p> | <p>2 Esdras: This book deals with the prophet Ezer’s visions of the end times.</p> |
| <p>Baruch: Letters to the Jews in Jerusalem from Babylon (present day Iraq) confessing the Jewish nation’s sins and praying for deliverance.</p> | <p>2 Maccabees: Story of the war continues but this includes help from God.</p> | <p>4 Maccabees: This book deals with a plea to the Jews to keep observing Jewish laws and customs even though the Syrians are executing Jews who don’t renounce their faith. This book is set in the days before the revolt against the Syrian rule.</p> |
