From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Here we are once again at the start of our program year! It is an exciting time for me because I am looking forward to new Bible Study classes and new Adult Formation classes. And I am not the only one who is excited! The teachers are getting ready for our Sunday morning classes by getting it set up and ready to roll too! And on Wednesdays we begin our youth group meetings too! Olivia, our youth minister begins leading our Wednesday youth group meetings which is really, really exciting! And finally another piece of exciting news, we are beginning a Men's study and prayer breakfast. It will take place at 9 am in the chapel every other Friday. It will be led by men in the church. It will be a great way to get to know other men and grow in one's faith. So it is not only exciting but fun to see our church begin all our activities again.

I cannot give you a good preview of what all the other classes are going to be covering but I can give you a sneak preview of the Adult Bible study and Adult Formation classes! This year in Adult Bible study we will do a study on who God is. We will begin by looking at the names of God as given to us in the Bible. Names are important. They are a means of self-revelation. I am called Fr. Lance by many in our church; letters come to me as Reverend Lance Wallace. My wife calls me Sweetie, my mom called me Lanny. My children call me Dad; it used to be Daddy. My grandchildren call me Poppy and my friends call me Lance. Names describe and identify how we relate to another. Names are foundational for building a relationship. Throughout the Bible God reveals himself through various names. These names served to identify and describe God. In the first lessons of our study we will look at the different names of God and see how God has revealed himself and how we can understand him better through His name. This is going to be a great study which will help us come to know our God better.

In our first Adult Formation classes we will be studying prayer. Prayer can feel mysteriously difficult, boringly perfunctory, and frustratingly out of our control. Often prayer brings us comfort, but sometimes, especially when there aren't easy resolutions or when our prayers go unanswered, it intensifies and focuses our sense of longing, pain, and care. In Adult Formation classes we will be looking at prayer, the different types of prayer described in the Bible and the different types of prayer in our tradition.

I encourage all of you to get involved in Adult Bible Study and/or Adult Formation. It is important for each of us to continue to grow as Christians. The Apostle Paul says in his letter to the Romans, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect." Our minds are renewed as we learn more about God and more about what he has told us in the Scriptures.

Also as we begin our program year I encourage you not only to begin learning more of your faith but to get involved and serve in some way. We need people to be greeters at each service. We need people to volunteer to be Scripture readers. We need folks to help with the child care during the 10:30 service. We have many places for service, the Thrift Shop, the Altar Guild, Backpacks ministry, Food Pantry, Pastoral visitation, lawn maintenance, computer operator, choir member and there are many more! Talk to me about serving and get involved!

I am excited about our new program year. I hope you choose to get involved by joining a class and by serving!

The Deacon's Bench

Deacon Ludwig Wallner VESTMENTS (Part 1)



Eucharistic vestments as the term implies are the vestments worn during the celebration of the Eucharist. The Celebrant, Deacon and LEMs each have a vestment which is somewhat unique to their order.

The Celebrant (here at St. Andrew's) begins vesting by first putting on an **Amice**. An Amice is a large rectangular piece of white cloth with two ties. The amice is worn at the neck with the ties going around the celebrant's back and tied in the front. The purpose of the amice is to form a collar for the alb.

The next vestment to be worn is the **Alb.**The alb is usually a white vestment, although some churches use a natural colored material, which covers the person from the neck to the ankles. This vestment is also worn by the deacons and the LEMs. The alb may come with or without a collar (such as the amice) or an attached collar or it may be fitted with a hood.

The alb is fastened at the waist by a rope looking belt known as a **Cincture**. The deacons and LEMs usually tie the cincture by a simple slip knot on the left side with the ends allowed to hang. The celebrant knots the cincture in the middle and forms a loop on either side of the knot. This creates an opening which allows the celebrant to place the ends of the stole. This fastening of the stole prevents it from shifting during the service.

The next vestment to be put on is the **Stole.** The stole is a long narrow strip of material, often with religious symbols and is the color of the liturgical season. This vestment is unique to deacons and priests; however deacons wear the stole over the left shoulder so that it crosses the chest and back and is fastened together under the right arm. Priests wear the stole around the neck with the ends hanging down in front. Many priests will thread the ends of their stoles through the cincture to keep it in place.

The final vestment to be put on is the **Chasuble.** The chasuble is the outermost worn garment and is worn over the rest of the vestments and is unique to the priest. A chasuble is usually an oval-shaped cloak with an opening in the center for the celebrant's

head. It is worn like a poncho so that it drapes over the arms, back and chest of the celebrant.

A deacon may wear an outer vestment called a **Dalmatic.** A dalmatic is a tunic like vestment which is decorated with strips of material that run vertically from front to back and are connected in the front and back by two horizontal strips of the same material. Unlike the chasuble, the dalmatic has sleeves. Dalmatics, like chasubles, are in the liturgical colors of the season.

Should We Sing During Communion?

Most of us have heard "Those who sing pray twice." Music offered at worship inspires us either by listening—taking the melodies and words into our hearts and minds—or when appropriate by singing along, feeling the power of the lyrics lift us closer to our Lord and to each other. What about singing during the Communion? The "Communion" hymns in our Episcopal hymnal can be used at any appropriate time including in procession or as Gradual (sequence) hymns.

Our Vestry recently determined that at services where music is offered, we shall offer only instrumental, meditative music as we share the Communion. Since this is a change for us, I wanted to offer some background on why this is an appropriate choice [paraphrased from "Truth for the World" online]:

There are no Biblical references to early Christians singing while sharing the Lord's Supper.

Through singing we speak to, teach and admonish one another (Ephesians 5:19; Colossians 3:16). This involves thoughtful consideration and sincere expression from the heart, and attentiveness to the voices of others. It requires the use of both spirit and mind (I Corinthians 14:15) and touches the lives of those who hear it (Acts 16:25). This reveals two aspects to our singing in worship: giving praise and honor to Almighty God, and edifying each other as we listen and speak to one another in song.

The Lord's Supper is a communion (sharing) in the body and blood of Jesus in which we who are many are one body (I Corinthians 10:16-17); a memorial where we remember Jesus' sacrifice on the cross (I Corinthians 11:24-25); a proclamation where we profess the Lord's death until He comes again (I Corinthians 11:26); and a personal time of self-examination (I Corinthians 11:28) when Christians individually consider the price paid for their sins.

Singing during Communion can create confusion or prevent us from focusing on the appropriate aspects of the Lord's Supper by distracting those trying to examine themselves. The Apostle Paul reminds us, "Everyone ought to examine themselves before they eat of the bread and drink from the cup." (I Corinthians 11:28). Paul sought to *eliminate confusion* and build up the body by restoring purpose and value to worship through the clarity of a meaningful message understandable by all.

Singing and partaking in Communion are two separate acts of worship. It is simply impossible for an individual to properly execute both acts of worship at the same time since they have different requirements.

Please let Fr. Lance or myself know how this new offering of instrumental music during the Lord's Supper has enhanced your Communion experience. Your thoughts and prayers are, as always, most welcome and appreciated.
