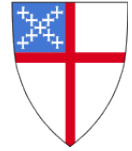

The Deacon's Bench

MAKING THE SIGN OF THE CROSS



Making the Sign of the Cross is a physical act which links the cross with our claim that we can experience "all the benefits of Christ's passion". During our worship services one can observe several variations of this act taking place.

One such place is just as the Gospel is about to be proclaimed. The deacon or priest will make a small sign of the cross on the page at the beginning of the Gospel passage followed by making the sign of the cross on their forehead, lips and chest. This is a physical prayer which says "may the Gospel be in my mind, on my lips and in my heart".

The time that most of us are aware of it is at the conclusion of confession and at the final blessing at the conclusion of the worship service. The priest will make the sign over the congregation while proclaiming forgiveness of sins. Thus we understand we are forgiven because of Jesus' work on the cross. The priest also makes the sign of the cross when bestowing a final blessing so we understand that we have God's blessing through the cross. This is in the shape of a large cross in the air, first forming the vertical axis and then the horizontal axis.

The third form of making the sign of the cross is on the forehead of persons being baptized or confirmed at which time you will hear the celebrant say while using blessed oil, "You are sealed as Christ's own forever". At the conclusion of prayers for healing a person may be anointed with oil for healing while the sign of the cross is made on the forehead indicating we are healed by Christ's work on the cross.

The making of the sign of the cross on a person's forehead may also be used as an individual blessing for certain circumstances, usually without the use of oil. This form of making the sign of the cross on one's forehead is used on Ash Wednesday while ashes are being imposed.

During the service many individuals will sign themselves. This usually is done as the celebrant bestows a blessing—this act is a physical "Amen" to the blessing. Other individuals will bless themselves at the end of the Creed, and some at the "Bless Us" phrase in the Eucharistic Prayer. Others find the making of

the sign of the cross before and after receiving communion very meaningful.

The most accepted way for individuals to make the sign of the cross is to first touch the forehead, then the diaphragm just about the belt, the left shoulder and then the right shoulder using just your fingertips on your right hand. In some churches people are taught that while making the sign on themselves you "pray" "In the Name of the Father" while touching the forehead, "and of the Son" while touching the diaphragm and "the Holy" while touching the left shoulder and "Spirit" while touching the right shoulder. "Amen".

People who may feel out of place may ask, "Do I have to make the sign of the cross on myself"? No. "If I do decide to make the sign of the cross on myself, do I have to pray anything"? No. During the worship of God you do those things which bring you closed to Almighty God and into a closer loving relationship with His Son, our Lord and Savior Jesus.

Altar Guild

Greetings and blessings: The Altar Guild is getting nicely settled into the newly remodeled Sacristy as we begin to slow down and ease into our less busy season. Many of you will be traveling so get your travel prayers and come back safely!

You may have noticed that the Altar frontal quickly went from Easter Alleluia

white to Red to plain white and is now green which will be our color until November. Altar colors, including the vested Chalice, the celebrant's Chasuble and the lectern hanging depict our place in the church year. White, which symbolizes purity, joy and truth, is used for memorials, weddings, masses for the dead as well as other feasts. We have our white Alleluia frontal for the Easter Season. Red, the color of fire and blood, is used during Holy Week and for Pentecost which we just celebrated. Green, symbolic of living things and God's creation, is displayed during "Ordinary Time" after Epiphany and Pentecost. Purple or royal blue symbolizes penitence and expectation and is used during Advent and Lent. There are many other celebrations and ritual masses that require color changes but unless we have a service scheduled, the color is not changed. "This sequence of liturgical colors has a principle role in Christian visual education."

It is the responsibility of the Altar Guild to coordinate the flowers, the banners and vest the altar with the proper liturgical colors according to the church year and as needed for special services. These changes are made with care and reverence as each color symbolizes significant events in our church and events on the Christian calendar. If you are interested in learning more about these liturgical colors or in becoming a part of the Altar Guild Ministry please contact me.

Remember, greet guests warmly, offer assistance as needed and invite friends, family and acquaintances to worship with us. As we grow in numbers and the knowledge of God's Word, so do our gifts to fulfill His work.

Flavors were an interesting topic. Why are some flavors favored and others disregarded? It's nice to know that Jesus loves all of us especially when you may be the one who may be left out.


We talked about being confronted with

Reading Program coming to St. Andrew's

St. Andrew's is hosting a summer developmental reading program sponsored by the University of South Florida and the Institute of Reading Development. Their central goal in these classes is both to improve each student's confidence in his or her reading ability and to instill within them a love of reading. This is accomplished by the strength of the curriculum and the manner in which it is presented. All programs are taught in a workshop format, which enables the teachers to guide and motivate each student to take an active role in their own success. Here is some further information describing the developmental reading classes for children and adults.

Program 00: For entering Kindergartners.
Program 01: For 1st Graders. Program 02: For 2nd Graders

At the primary level the developmental classes encourage children to develop reading and listening skills by working with storytelling, rhyming patterns and initial sound games. In addition, the program supplies students and parents with instructional materials designed to improve comprehension.

Program 03: For 3rd Graders. Program 04: For 4th Graders. Program 05: For 5th Graders.

At the elementary level they emphasize the transition students make into reading for information. In order to read successfully students, must read fluently. By studying and improving upon word attack skills, use of punctuation, and vocabulary development, children internalize the mechanics of reading, which allows them to focus more on content. Additionally, they introduce comprehension strategies, which assist in reading fiction and non-fiction.

Program 08: For 6th, 7th and 8th Graders.
Program 11: For 9th, 10th and 11th Graders.

At this level they address students' need for increased efficiency. The programs continue to build on each child's reading foundation while providing techniques for increasing reading speed and strategies for boosting

comprehension. At this level they emphasize study skills so that students are equipped to tackle the demanding requirements of junior and senior high school.

This group will be on our campus Monday and Tuesday in Krysher Hall beginning July 9th through August 7th. Our hope is that these children will gain skills that will make them more successful in school and as lifelong learners.

Altar Kneelers

While archiving documents for our files, we came upon this article describing the altar kneelers and thought it was very interesting. The wonderful ladies who took hours to stitch these beautiful needlepoint kneelers did so with a specific mission—to tell the story of St. Andrew's life with pictures. Each kneeler contains St. Andrew's cross in the center with a symbol on each side. There are 15 kneelers that are 12 inches wide and range from 36 to 42 inches long. The boxing pieces across the front and on the exposed sides are decorated with a Greek Key design. The next time you are at the altar, remember that the founding members of our congregation went to great lengths to give us a lasting reminder of St. Andrew's life and faith.

Lamb of God – represents Christ

Maltese Cross – represents St. John the Baptist—St. Andrew was a follower and was baptized by him

Dove – represents Baptism

St. Peter's Cross – St. Andrew's brother—cross is upside down representing the upside down crucifixion of St. Peter

Anchor – St. Andrew was a fisherman

Ship - symbol for a fisherman

Net – used in catching fish, this one is being thrown

Bread – represents the five loaves of bread in a basket also found by St. Andrew on the Mount.

Open Bible – represents teaching

Shell – symbol for fishermen

Greek Columns – St. Andrew served in Greece

Eastern Cross – St. Andrew served in Russia and is a Patron Saint

Thistle – St. Andrew is a Patron Saint of Scotland

Apostles' Cross – represents the 12 Apostles as depicted with the 12 crosses






