From the Rector

Dear Friends and Members of St. Andrew's,

The holiest and highest feast day of the Christian year is quickly approaching. The church can exist without celebrating the birth of Jesus at Christmas; the church can exist without celebrating the Wise Men worshipping Jesus as God in human form at Epiphany. The church can exist without celebrating the Holy Spirit falling on the believers at Pentecost; the church can exist without actually celebrating any holy day except one; it cannot exist without Easter.

Easter is the foundation day of our faith and lays the foundation for the church. As the Apostle Paul once wrote, "If Christ has not been raised from the dead then our faith is in vain." In other words, if Jesus did not rise from the dead on Easter morning, then all that we do as Christians and all that we believe is futile. If Jesus did not rise from the dead, then our hope for any life after we die is foolish. If Jesus did not rise from the dead, then trying to be good and denying ourselves any pleasures during our life-time is short-sighted. If this life is all there is and if there is no such thing as life after we die, then we should have the life philosophy of, "Let's eat, drink, and be merry for tomorrow we die."

But the fact is, Jesus WAS RAISED from the dead. Dr. Wilbur Morehead Smith once wrote, "we know more about the details of the hours immediately before and the actual death of Jesus, in and near Jerusalem, than we know about the death of any other one man in all the ancient world." That Jesus from Nazareth was dead is an historical fact. And it is also an historical fact that he rose from the dead. He was dead and then he came back to life. It is not a myth. It is not simply wishful thinking. It is not because we like Hollywood endings to our stories. God did raise Jesus from the dead. We have eye witnesses to the fact of his resurrection. And when God raised Jesus from the dead he validated everything Jesus ever said and did.

And that is the point of Easter isn't it? Jesus rose from the dead. And because he rose now we know and believe that all he said and promised is true. Because he rose from the dead, our sins can indeed be forgiven and we can be reconciled to God. Because he rose from the dead, we can be reborn

spiritually, have new life in God, and know God's great love for us. Because he rose from the dead, we are able to have his Holy Spirit live within us and through his Holy Spirit we are able to change and live new lives. Because he rose from the dead, we know that those who have died before us who had faith in Christ are now with Jesus where he is in heaven. Because he rose from the dead, we know that we too who believe in Jesus, will have life even after our bodies stop living and we will be given new resurrection bodies.

I have not mentioned all of the benefits of the resurrection but you get the point. The highest and holiest day of the year is quickly approaching. It should be with great joy and awe that we celebrate the fact of our Lord Jesus' death and resurrection. Very soon we will all say together, "The Lord is risen!" "The Lord is risen indeed."

All are invited to participate in as many services as possible during Holy Week. The vestry and I expect our members to attend at least one of the services during Holy Week. On Wednesday we will have our 10 am service which will be a Rite 1 service. On Maundy Thursday we will have a soup supper at 6 pm followed at 7 pm with the foot washing service and the stripping of the altar. We will observe on Good Friday the liturgy of the day followed by Stations of the Cross. There is the Memorial Garden service followed by the flowering of the Cross on Holy Saturday at 4pm.

Saturday at 8:30 pm we have our Easter Vigil. It is a candlelight service. We begin outside in the dark and make our way into the church. After the reading of the scriptures we Ring the Bells and we have a baptism! It is a wonderful service! And then we will have glorious Easter morning services at 8 am and 10:30 am. I am smiling in joyful anticipation as I write these words. Looking forward to wishing you a wonderful Easter and greeting you with the glorious words of "Christ is risen!"

EPISCOPAL OR ANGLICAN?

Several months ago, I was asked the question is there a difference between Episcopal Church and Anglican Church? I gave what I thought was a fairly accurate response, but I wanted to be sure. This is what I have found out about the Anglican Church.

England is really "Angleland" or the land of the Angles, one of the Germanic tribes that settled there in the early Christian era, therefore the Church of England is also "ecclesia anglicana" or the Anglican Church.

Anglicans are properly all those who are communicants of churches- including the Episcopal Church - which are part of the Anglican Communion and owe their identity to their historic and liturgical relationship to the Church of England.

We usually call ourselves Episcopalians and not Anglicans, although some Episcopal Churches refer to themselves as Anglican.

Anglicanism usually refers to the claim of the Church of England to represent a body of Christendom distinct from Orthodox, Roman Catholic, and other Protestant traditions. The central concerns of Anglicanism are summarized in the Lambeth Quadrilateral. This was a statement approved by Anglican Bishops at the Lambeth Conference of 1888 concerning what the Anglican Communion held were the essential marks of the one holy catholic and apostolic church. These four points were (1) The Holy Scriptures, both Old and New Testaments contain all things necessary for salvation, (2) The Apostles Creed as the baptismal symbol and the Nicene Creed as the sufficient statements of Christian faith, (3) We have two sacraments – Baptism and Eucharist and (4) the historic episcopate as a symbol of the unity of the church, and suggests that Anglicanism is a tradition that finds its identity in what its members do together, rather than what it insist they affirm. Anglicanism combines Protestant emphasis on the importance of Scripture and individual conscience with Catholic concern for worship, hierarchy, and tradition: Anglicanism has often been described as a "middle way or bridge tradition".

While this may be helpful, I find that it may obscure our distinctive nature of Episcopalian as a tradition in its own right, complex and at times hard to pin down or

fully explain but we are faithful in our desire to share the Good News of Jesus and the boundless grace of God.

Side Note: You may turn to the Book of Common Prayer pp. 876 – 878 for the actual and complete text of the Quadrilteral.




