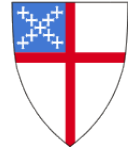

### From the Rector

Dear Friends,

On March 6<sup>th</sup> we observe Ash Wednesday. Ashes are ceremonially placed on the heads of Christians on Ash Wednesday, either by being sprinkled over their heads or, in English-speaking countries, more often by being marked on their foreheads as a visible cross. The words (based on Genesis 3:19) used traditionally to accompany this gesture are, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This custom is credited to Pope Gregory I the Great (c. 540–604). In the 1969 revision of the Roman Rite, an alternative formula (based on Mark 1:15) was introduced and given first place "Repent, and believe in the Gospel." The old formula, based on the words spoken to Adam and Eve after their sin reminds worshippers of their sinfulness and mortality and thus, implicitly, of their need to repent in time. The newer formula makes explicit what was only implicit in the old. At St. Andrew's we use the traditional phrase.

So what is the big deal? Why do we observe Ash Wednesday? Ash Wednesday is the day we begin the season of Lent, that is, a season of repentance. And while it is true that most of us are not mass murderers or sinners on such a grand scale, all of us are in fact, sinners. All of us to varying degrees act selfishly, or act in ways that do not show love to our neighbors. None of us love God with all our hearts, minds, souls, and strength. In other words, since none of us are perfect, all of us have some area upon which to work in order to become better.

In the Episcopal Church calendar there are only two days when it is recommended that we fast. Ash Wednesday is one and Good Friday is the other one. Traditionally the fast is from sunrise to sunset. For some the fast continues in some form throughout the entire season. This is where the 'giving up something' for Lent comes. So why should we fast? We see from Scripture and from our own experience that fasting is a natural response when we are grieving. Most of us who have gone through periods of great grief know that during this time, food is not even something we want to

think about much less eat. This is how God wants us to feel about our sins. He wants us to grieve over what we have done. He wants us to grieve over how we are. He wants us to feel bad about how we are not loving others the way we ought to love them. He wants us to feel sorrow for how we are not loving God with all of our hearts. It is from this feeling of sorrow over our sin that our fasting is supposed to come. During Lent many people fast as a way of developing self-control and there is nothing wrong with that. However fasting for that reason during Lent is missing the point of the Lenten season.

But the fact of the matter is that most of us do not typically feel a lot of grief over our sins. We might experience a twinge of guilt or a stab of remorse but generally speaking most of us feel pretty good about ourselves. This is one of the primary reasons for this season of Lent. It is during this time we are supposed to consider the standards God has set and consider the people He has called us to become and to realize how short of those standards we actually are. It is in the midst of understanding how much we are loved by God and understanding how much Christ suffered for us in order to become God's children that we are able to truly understand what we are messing up. It is in having this mindset that we are able to grieve properly over our sins and are then given His grace to change.

Lent is one of the best seasons of the Christian calendar because it is during this time we once again see and sense God's call to us to be his children. And as we respond to His call, we feel His Holy Spirit moving in our lives; we feel God Himself moving in us, and that is a glorious and wonderful experience!

My prayer for us here at St. Andrew's is that we will experience God's presence and love anew in our lives during this Holy season of Lent.

## The Deacon's Bench

THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY

During the "Prayers of the People", we pray for the Archbishop of Canterbury and our Presiding Bishop. How are the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Presiding Bishop different?



Canterbury is a city in England and is said to be site of the first church established by St. Augustine when he came to bring Christianity to England in the year 597 A.D. It is also the location of the cathedral of the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Archbishop of Canterbury is historically regarded as the primate of the entire Church of England and the spiritual leader of the Anglican Communion.

The title of Archbishop is given in the Church of England and some other branches of the Anglican Communion to bishops who have major responsibilities beyond the limits of their own dioceses. England has two archbishops: The Archbishop of Canterbury and the Archbishop of York, both of whom are responsible for a province containing many dioceses.

In the Episcopal Church we do not have archbishops but rather we call our chief bishop the Presiding Bishop. Unlike an archbishop our Presiding Bishop ceases to be a diocesan bishop when elected to the position of Presiding Bishop. Up until 1919, the presiding bishop was the most senior diocesan bishop in attendance of the House of Bishops. In the 1940's, the presiding bishop became elected and it was decided that this person would resign from any diocesan pastoral care responsibility.

In the Episcopal Church the Presiding Bishop's chief responsibilities are primarily administrative rather than sacramental. The Presiding Bishop speaks on church issues, articulates policy and presides over House of Bishops gatherings. In the ordination of bishops however, the Book of Common Prayer intends the Presiding Bishop to attend and to be the chief consecrator during the service.

The Presiding Bishop is elected at a meeting of the General Convention by the House of Bishops with the concurrence of the House of Deputies. The term of office was fixed at 9 years in 1936. The Presiding Bishop's offices are located in New York City. He does not have a cathedral but his bishop's chair is in the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul in Washington, DC.

Several other church denominations in the United States also have presiding bishops: these include Lutheran, Latter Day Saints, Church of God in Christ, and the Reformed Episcopal Church.

March 6 is Ash Wednesday – already! Seems like we just got through Christmas! **Easter Choir** rehearsals begin **Saturday, March 2nd** at 1 pm in the Krysher Hall Music Room. I hope you'll join us for the music and fellowship.

The service music changes during Lent. You'll notice some different music beginning with March 10. On that day, Fr. Lance and the choir will process in to "The Great Litany." St. Andrew's traditionally uses this on the first Sunday in Lent. The Litany is an intercessory prayer that includes petitions spoken or sung by a leader, with responses by the congregation. It was used as early as the fifth century in Rome. The first English language rite, prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer, was published in 1544. The 1979 *Book of Common Prayer* titled it "The Great Litany" to distinguish it from other litanies in the prayer book. During The Great Litany, the officiant and people may kneel or stand, or it may be done in procession (which is what we do here at St. Andrew's). Because of its penitential tone, it is especially appropriate during Lent.

Many thanks to everyone who attended or participated in our Feb. 16 "Strings & Things: All You Need is Love" show. We had a great audience and a great time presenting and singing along to all kinds of memorable love songs. Our next show will probably be in May, a tribute to Broadway. I'll have more info in next month's Chimes.
