From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Well, I guess it is now time to say that summer is over even here in Spring Hill, Florida. The temperatures have dropped into the 80's and 70's and the humidity is also going down. We are looking forward to our annual Blessing of the Animals on October 6th. This is a celebration of St. Francis of Assisi and I ask God to bless all the animals that people bring to me at 3 pm on that Sunday afternoon. We usually have between 30 and 40. It is a fairly short service because dogs, cats, and birds are not known for long attention spans. If you have a furry friend (or feathered, scaled or whatever) you are welcome to bring it to this service to get blessed and your neighbors' pets are also welcome.

On the last week of September we began another Episcopal Traditions set of classes, but it is not too late to join. These classes are for those people who are interested in becoming members of St. Andrew's. In these classes we cover who we are as Episcopalians and what we believe. The classes are open to everyone though and many who have been life-long Episcopalians have found the classes interesting and a good refresher. We cover not only what we believe, but from where we came and why we do what we do in worship services.

I was recently asked about our Wednesday morning services. I was asked if these services are specifically geared towards those with physical ailments. It is a good question. The service is certainly for those with physical ailments but also for those in mental and spiritual distress as well. Further, one can come for prayer not only for one's self but for others. Our Wednesday service is a wonderful service and people are helped and healed on a regular basis. Furthermore, the OSL is available for this same type of prayer during the time of Holy Communion in our Saturday and Sunday services. We have begun our Adult Bible study classes once more and are in the study of Elijah who is the most famous prophet in the Old Testament. In Adult Formation we have been studying the Intertestamental period of history and how it affected the time of Jesus.

Our church is busy. We have the weekend services, the Wednesday morning service, the Adult Bible study classes, Adult formation classes. We also have the youth group activities on Wednesday evening and the Sunday morning classes. We have the single women's group and men's group that meets during the month, the Pastoral and OSL, prayer chain, and Daughters of the King ministry, choir, back-pack ministry, altar guild work, the everyday ministry of the thrift shop, the food pantry, the children's reading ministry, greeters and ushers ministry, the computer operators, receptionists, and LEMs ministry.

And what is the point of all this activity? Is it so that we have a place for gathering socially for fun and friendship? Is it so we can try to help those in Spring Hill who are in need? Is it so we can help people learn about their faith and grow in their knowledge of God and his Holy Word? Is it so we can worship together? Yes, yes it is for <u>all</u> those reasons. We are not here simply so we can gather socially; Spring Hill does not need another club or group like the Elks or Rotary Club. We help people in need but we are not simply a Salvation Army or Goodwill either. We spend lots of time training and teaching our youth and our adult members more about our faith and about Jesus, but we are not simply a Bible school or seminary. And yes we worship God through Jesus our Lord, but again, there is more to it than only worship.

We are St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, followers and disciples of Jesus Christ, and as such we are part of the body of Jesus Christ here in Spring Hill. Jesus lived in ancient Israel some 2,000 years ago; we are trying to model our lives after his life and we are trying to follow the directions his apostles left us. During his life, Jesus spent time simply hanging out with his disciples talking and laughing with them; he encouraged and comforted them. In the same way we make time to spend together so we can talk, laugh, encourage, and comfort each other. Jesus spent time helping people who needed help. And we have any number of ministries focused on helping each other and others in our community. Jesus continuously taught his followers about who God is, what God wanted them to know, and how to live. Again, we also teach what Jesus taught and what his Apostles taught so we know

who God is and what He expects from us. And because of all this, we <u>want</u> to worship God together; we want to worship him because of who He is and for the love and care he shows us.

All of this is what the church of Jesus Christ does. And I am very pleased to say we at St. Andrew's are part of the church of Jesus Christ and we do these

The Deacon's Bench

Deacon Ludwig Wallner James, the Son of Zebedee

There are 3 men in particular we usually think of when we talk about the disciples. We always think of Peter, James and John. We know the least about James. Despite the relative silence of the scriptures concerning James he is noteworthy among the apostles. Perhaps the most unusual thing about his life was the manner and time of his death. James was the first of Christ's apostles to be martyred. Judas and James are the only two of the original apostles whose deaths have scriptural accounts.

James was the older brother to John (The Beloved). With John he was partner with Andrew and Peter and their father Zebedee in the fishing trade. They owned several boats and employed hired servants. It is assumed that they were rather affluent. There is also some evidence that James may have been a first cousin of Jesus and would have been acquainted with him from infancy.

James was present at the raising of Jarius' daughter, the Transfiguration and the agony in the garden of Gethsemane.

Tradition tells of a missionary journey of Peter and James to India. James is said to have preached to the twelve scattered tribes abroad and as such persuaded them to give their first-fruits to the church instead of Herod.

An interesting thing to consider is that James is not mentioned in the Gospel of John. Assuming that John wrote the Gospel of John one has to wonder why he doesn't mention James, his brother. John also hides his own identity in this Gospel by referring to himself as "beloved disciple".

One legend surrounding James' death, taken from the book of Clement of Alexander, tells the story of one person who led James to his final judgement in Jerusalem was so moved by James' testimony that he also confessed that he was a Christian. He then begged for James to forgive him. Both James and the other man were led away and beheaded together. James was executed by King Herod Agrippa about the year AD 44 shortly before Herod's own death." About that time King Herod began to persecute the church. He had the apostle James (John's brother) killed with a sword". (Full account is found in Acts 12:1-2)

We also talked about thinking of others first especially when we have a stash of candy.


We continue to talk to each other about our lives from week to week.


