From the Rector

Dear Friends,

We are moving right into 2020. So far here at St. Andrew's it is a great year! We have had our annual meeting. We have a new vestry and great plans for our new year.

Around this time of year we always begin to think about Ash Wednesday and Lent. Some years we observe Ash Wednesday as late as March. This year it makes it into February - but just barely on the 26^{th} and from there we enter into the season of Lent. Ash Wednesday is one of those peculiar Christian Holy Days that doesn't really make a lot of sense to people outside the Christian faith and it even causes some Christians to wonder why we do it. Why do people head to church and have some person say, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return"? And then we get some ashes smeared on our foreheads. So how is it helpful to tell people that their lives had a very humble beginning and that sadly their lives will have a very humble end as well? Certainly it may be realistic; but it is also a bit, well, depressing, isn't it?

We know for a fact that people do indeed return to dust after they die. Why do we have this service Ash Wednesday to remind us of our mortality? Why not try to ignore this coming end to our natural existence and pretend to ourselves that it will happen a long time off? Why do we make ourselves stare at and consider the fact that we will die?

This service is not really meant to be ghoulish; but it certainly is intended to be sobering. This service is here to remind us to look at our lives, our times, here on this earth and see them as God sees them. Our lives last only a short time whether our lifetimes are measured in hours or for 80 or 90 or more years. In the context of the span of eternity our lifetimes here on earth are a mere blink of the eye. And yet, even though our mortal life may be brief, God has given us <u>life</u>, He has brought us into the

world and we have been given the opportunity to know Him and others, to love Him and others. We have been given the privilege to experience life with our senses and emotions and our minds. What a wonderful privilege life is! Because it is a privilege and a gift, we ought not to waste it! Over the years one of the things I have noticed is that people who have had close encounters with death, or who are living with a terminal disease are very aware of the preciousness of life. And this is the point of the Ash Wednesday service. This service is to help us to see how short our time here is. This service is to help us to prioritize and see anew what is really important in our lives. So this service that is so serious and considered morbid by some is actually intended to help us go out and live more fully. It is intended to help us seize the moments that God gives us more fervently and use them more fully. It is intended that we learn to value and enjoy our relationships with others more. We are supposed to leave our Ash Wednesday service with a renewed thankful hearts for our lives and for the lives God has given around us. We are to leave appreciating the beauty of our world with renewed joy. We are to leave the service with a renewed desire to live our lives as God who gave us life intended, and that is with fullness and abundance.

As usual we will have two Ash Wednesday services, one at 10 am and one at 6 pm. We will not have our Adult Bible Study classes on this day. Our youth will once again be serving us pancakes on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday which this year will be Tuesday, February 25. There will be more information as this date draws nearer.

I hope you will join us this year in observing Ash Wednesday and I hope that you will learn to really live; that you will live your

Life Line Screening at St. Andrew's Saturday, March 21, 2020

Taking preventive steps such as making lifestyle changes and getting health screenings may help you avoid a stroke or other serious health events in the future. Early intervention is important.

If you are over fifty and have diabetes, high cholesterol, high blood pressure or if you have a family history of stroke or heart disease, you may be at risk, even if you feel great. Actually four out of five people who suffer a stroke have no apparent symptoms and nearly 30% of strokes occur under the age of 65. The good news is that according to the National Stroke Association, 80% of strokes can be prevented.

Life Line Screening will help you find out if you are at risk, so you and your doctor can take the next steps and be proactive about your health.
