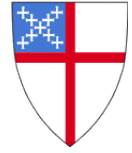

From the Rector

Dear Friends,

February was a wonderful month here at St. Andrew's. We had a super Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner—thank you young people, youth leaders, and all those who helped with the cooking and cleaning for that once again! The next day we had meaningful Ash Wednesday services.

And now, once again we are in the season of Lent. We fast, we stop drinking wine or eating chocolate or we stop doing something that ordinarily we really enjoy and for what reason? Why do we partake in such uncomfortable behavior? How can people say to each other, "Have a blessed Lent when we act like this?"

Lent is based upon the forty days of fasting that Jesus himself did right after he was baptized. You recall that as soon as he was baptized he went off into the wilderness to be tested by the Evil One. One of the reasons he did this was to prepare for his public ministry. As soon as he finished this time in the wilderness he started his public preaching, teaching, and healing ministry. What does that have to do with us at Lent you may ask? Like him, we are preparing ourselves. Ever since the fourth and fifth century the early church made time to prepare for Easter. As the years rolled by it gradually came to be the forty days we now have. But we like them still use this time to prepare ourselves for Easter. We prepare ourselves for the celebration of our Lord's mighty resurrection and victory over Evil, Death, and the Devil. If Ash Wednesday is the day we acknowledge our mortality; Easter is the day we celebrate our immortality! And we are both aren't we? We are both mortal and immortal. We are both physical and spiritual. Our bodies are physical and mortal; our souls, since we have been reborn through Jesus, are immortal and spiritual. Throughout Lent, we work on preparing ourselves for our spiritual, immortal lives. During this time we try to exercise self-control over those parts of our lives that have to do with indulging ourselves and those habits that make us

forget our mortality. We do this because we are going to leave these lives and all that pertains to our lives behind! We exercise this self-control over indulging and bad habits through our fasting. The flip side of our preparation is to work on strengthening our spiritual lives; these are the parts of us that will be living forever.

So practically speaking how do we do this? How do we prepare for Easter; how do we prepare for our coming immortality? This sort of preparation is spiritual. We are trying to refocus our hearts on our heavenly home. Every year about this time Joanne Lillpopp reminds me that it is not enough to give up something for Lent; we need to pick up something as well. And she is right. She is referencing our spiritual preparation. In this preparation we are to try to develop our 'forever' disciplines. That is things we will start now or perhaps increase now that we will carry with us into eternity. What are these sorts of 'forever' disciplines? These disciplines are things like learning to practice feeling and knowing God's presence in our day to day lives. We learn to know God's presence through meditation, prayer, and reading and considering God's Word. Another 'forever' discipline is learning to really listen and care for those around us. This is an outgrowth of learning to love our neighbors as ourselves. I suppose there are many of these types of disciplines. But those two are really good ones with which to start.

You may already have your Lenten practices firmly into place and that is good too. As always the church also has Lenten devotionals in the narthex to encourage you on your Lenten journey.

So this year may your time of exercising self-control and your time of developing a 'forever' discipline be one that changes your life! May you be able to control yourself better and be more aware of God's abiding presence in your life! With that in mind, have a blessed Lent my dear friends!

It is hard to believe we are already into another Lenten season. Our Altar Guild has diligently prepared the church for this period of reflection and self-examination. As Christians, we are asked to commit ourselves to three practices. First, we are asked to fast. This is a way of showing penance for our past actions. Next, we are expected to pray to others as well as ourselves. Finally, we are asked to give. This might be money, time, or talents.

St. Andrew's is providing all of us a number of opportunities to come together as a church community during the holiest of seasons. Fr. Lance continues Adult Formation on Saturdays and Sundays, while Fr. Fred is offering Bible study on Tuesday evenings relating to Christ's crucifixion. Holy Week will include Maundy Thursday and the washing of the feet; Good Friday services will offer Stations of the Cross, and the Great Easter Vigil on Saturday. Someone once said that Lent is equivalent to the Spring cleaning of our lives. This is a reassuring thought. During the process it is important to remember that Lent will ultimately lead to the joy of Easter.

As shown in the Treasurer's Report, we ended the first month of 2020 in the red by \$523.76—meaning that expenses were \$523.76 more than revenues. The reason for this is that the plate offerings and the non-pledge offerings received were only 62% of what was budgeted. But, we have to remember that these offerings are estimates based on last year's giving; we cannot accurately budget for these revenues.

If you are not currently putting your envelope or non-envelope number on your checks, I would ask that you do so as a courtesy to our counters; it makes their job a little easier. If you pledge or do not pledge but consistently give, you have a number assigned to you. If

you do not know your number, let me know.
