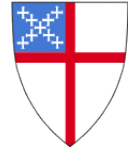

From the Rector

Dear Friends,

In March of this year we began to wear masks and social distance and stay at home. At that time there was a lot of fear and people began to buy up toilet paper pizzas. Do you remember going into the stores and seeing whole aisles that were empty? Everything in our society was feeling very strange. We have come back to somewhat a sense of normalcy even though we are still wearing masks and trying to keep socially distant from each other. We are able to meet again at church and even though things are a bit different it is still church and we can worship our Lord together. And that's good and it is a good reason to be thankful.

According to our church calendar, November is the last month of the church year. The first Sunday of Advent occurs on November 29th and on that day we begin a new church year. As the last month of the year, it is very appropriate that November be a month known for giving thanks. We start this thankfulness on November 2nd when we observe the Commemoration of All Faithful Departed; this is also known as All Souls' Day. It is on this day we make a point of remembering those who have passed into the nearer presence of the Lord. This service will be held at 10 A.M. in the Memorial Garden. And although we simply say their names in the service, it is a time for us to remember and be thankful for their lives and for the blessing their lives have been to us. Typically we remember things about the lives of our loved ones when we have the funeral services, but it is over the days and weeks and months and even the years that pass that things come to mind about those dearly departed that come to mind. Those memories may make us smile, even laugh, or they may tug at our hearts. On All Souls' Day we gather those memories up again and thank God for letting us have the time with our departed loved ones that we did.

And then there is the grand Thanksgiving Day itself towards the end of the month. This year things will probably be different than in other years. We may not be getting together with family and friends as usual. But no matter how it is observed Thanksgiving Day should be understood as a gift for us. It is a day that we have been given to be thankful to God for his blessings to us. Do you know that in the Bible one of the main faults God found with his people the Israelites was that they were not thankful? We are told over and over again to be thankful both in the Old Testament and in the New Tes-

tament. Is this command given to us because somehow God needs our thanks? No, God wants us to have thankful hearts because being thankful is the primary source of joy and contentment. If you and I want to feel joy and contentment, then we need to learn to be thankful. Thankfulness is not an automatic response for most of us. We need to make a conscious effort to notice things around us and consciously be appreciative to others and to God. Perhaps Daniel Defoe gave us some good advice through his fictitious character Robinson Crusoe. The first thing that Crusoe did when he found himself on a deserted island was to make out a list. On one side of the list he wrote down all his problems. On the other side of the list he wrote down all of his blessings. On one side he wrote: I do not have any clothes. On the other side he wrote: But it's warm and I don't really need any. On one side he wrote: All of the provisions were lost. On the other side he wrote: But there's plenty of fresh fruit and water on the island. And on down the list he went. In this fashion he discovered that for every negative aspect about his situation, there was a positive aspect, something to be thankful for. It is easy to find ourselves on an island of despair especially during this pandemic.

On Thanksgiving Day at 10 AM we will have a Rite I Eucharist. If you are able to come a bit early you will have a perfect place and opportunity to be able to quietly give thanks to God for his blessings to you this past year. God is so good to us; he is good to us because he loves us. In Ephesians chapter 3 we are taught to pray for the strength to be able to comprehend the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge. My prayer for all of us this November is that we will learn to be more and more thankful to our loving Heavenly Father.

Now thank we all our God With hearts and hands and voices, Who wondrous things hath done, In whom His earth rejoices Martin Rinkart 1586-1649 This is the first stanza of a truly wonderful hymn of thanksgiving. It was written c.1636 by a Lutheran minister by the name of Martin Rinkart as a blessing before meals. However, there is much more to this story. During this time a young America was busy in the founding of the Connecticut, Rhode Island and Maryland colonies. Unfortunately, things were much different in Europe. Reverend Rinkart lived in Eilenburg, Saxony, which was enduring the effects of the Thirty Years' War. The city was enduring great famine and the plague. At one point Rinkart was the only surviving pastor in the town and officiating over as many as 50 funerals a day. I have often wondered how this man was able to pen such words of praise and thanksgiving while dealing with the horrors he faced everyday. Would that I had but a fraction of the love and faith he exhibited. Despite all that our society has been forced to endure these last several months, each of us has so very much to be thankful for this season. God has given us so many blessings. Perhaps we can pause this season and thank God for, as Pastor Rinkart wrote, "His countless gifts of love." "We thank you for the blessing of family and friends, and for the loving care which surrounds us on every side." BCP p.836 On another note, the diocesan convention was held on October 17. Fr. Lance, Janie Frisk, Maureen Follansbee and I represented St. Andrews. Despite being held digitally, all agreed that it was successful and meaningful. Perhaps the most important news was that Bishop Smith announced his retirement. The overall selection process will take some time so do not anticipate a successor to be named in the immediate future. Dear Parishioners, Have you turned in your 2021 Pledge Card? It's not too late! As you know, the church's budget is based on the pledges we receive. Altar Guild

Welcome to the lovely fall season! We will soon be welcoming our snow birds back from their summer "nests".

Your Altar Guild continues to work behind the scenes to prepare communion and set up the altar each week. There are only a few of us currently serving but each of us must decide when the time is right to return to service.

As hard as it is to believe, we are approaching the holiday season. Advent begins the last weekend in November and we will be changing our altar colors from the "regular" green to the deep indigo to represent penitence. We only see this beautiful deep blue during this time and it is only used until Christmas. It is a visible reminder of the Advent season. In addition, the Advent wreath and candles will be a weekly reminder of the season.

The Advent wreath is made of evergreen boughs, symbolizing everlasting life. The circle represents the continuous love of God, with no beginning and no end, as well as the soul's immortality.

Each of the four colored candles in the Advent wreath represents a week leading to Christmas. Traditionally, three of the candles are purple or blue, (Hope, Preparation, Love) and one is pink (Joy). We light one candle each week until Christmas when the white candle in the middle is lit which is the Christ Candle. We prepare during Advent for the coming of Christ.

Throughout November, we will continue to be reminded about the importance of giving back during our stewardship campaign. Even if you are unable to attend church in person, your church is still providing assistance to the community, worship services and adult formation classes online each week. Many efforts have been made to keep you connected during this unprecedented time and maintenance, cleaning and upkeep of our campus continue. We urge you to look into your heart and pray about the many gifts and blessings God has given so abundantly and give back joyfully and generously.
