From the Rector

Dear Friends,

As I write this article the services of Holy Week are rapidly approaching. And each service is wonderful in its own right. The emphasis on service on Maundy Thursday is motivating. The emphasis on the Lord's suffering and sacrifice for us on Good Friday and Holy Saturday are moving. And then the great celebration of Easter itself in the Great Vigil and Easter morning is jubilant. And then, and then, well then things begin to calm down, except for us because we are now in the season of Easter. We have moved out of Lent, that serious season of penitence and introspection and moved into Eastertide. The season of Easter is seven weeks long. This time of the Christian year is a time in which we rejoice in the victory of Christ over death. But it is more than that because during this time we also examine our faith anew and consider what it is that we really believe. Do we really believe that a man came back to life? Do we really believe that this man was tortured and put to death on our account? Is this all some religious mumbo-jumbo? These are the big topics that we put on the table and consider in this season. After all in the annals of history there have been many tragic deaths. In the minds of many around us, God is not very important in our day to day lives either. There may be times of crisis when we need Him, but otherwise we can get along quite well on our own. Most people seem to think is that God simply wants

us to be pretty good people, that we try to be nice and fair to others, and then when we die we will all go to a "better place." These are common beliefs in our society right now, aren't they? I hear them frequently and I am sure you do as well. Yet, if Jesus died for our sins and rose again then all those beliefs are very wrong. They are wrong because if Jesus rose from the dead there is only one way to God. They are wrong because if Jesus died on the cross for our sins there is only one way to avoid condemnation. And if those things are true there is only one to find peace from our troubled consciences. That one way is through Jesus Christ. The fact of Easter is the resounding "NO" to a nonchalant view of God and eternity. God takes our lives and how we live very seriously. God takes all our wrong doing very seriously. God takes our brokenness and needs very seriously. This is why Jesus came into the world. This is why Jesus had to die to pay the penalty for our sins and the sins of the human race; he had to because God considers our sins very seriously. This is also why we have our communion every week. During Holy Communion we remember that Christ was willing to be broken for us and as we turn to Him he will help our broken lives be made whole. During Holy Communion we remember that Christ shed His blood and as we turn to Him our empty souls can be filled. This is all true because Jesus did rise from the dead and that day was and is the most important day in all of human history!

May you this month have a glorious Easter and a jubilant Easter season!

Memorial Garden

Many of you have visited the Memorial Garden since the restoration was completed and we have heard many positive and favorable comments on the appearance. This is how it all began:

The project began in early October. Since the shrubs and plants had reached their life expectancy it was necessary to remove the old plants, replace them with new ones and spread mulch around them. Due to settling, most of the grave markers were lifted, leveled and new base placed underneath to keep them stable. Using the map of sites, blank stones were placed in the available spaces to make it easier to identify sites.

The statue of Jesus and the Memorial Garden Monument were moved to a more prominent position. The old border was removed and new curbing put in that encircled the statue and the new plants. Crosses were placed on the curbing to give a look of reverence to the whole Garden.

New sod was put down on the bare ground between the rows of markers and the sprinkler was repaired to assure the water was adequate for the new plantings. Stones were placed around the base of the statue and monument.

The project was completed in March. We are blessed to have had the time, talent and resources to restore our Memorial Garden to a beautiful place of calm reflection.

Please join us for the rededication of the Memorial Garden on Holy Saturday. If you are unable to attend, take a few minutes to visit what a beautiful garden of remembrance we have here at St. Andrew's.
