From the Rector



Dear Friends,

We have been enjoying a quiet sum-

mer at St. Andrew's, but even though it has been fairly quiet we have been having some great times together. This past month we had a great Fourth of July picnic and then mid-way through the month there was a Bible Trivia game night. This coming month the big event is the St. Andrew's Sock-Hop. It will be on August 19th shortly after the Saturday service at 5:30. We enjoyed this last year and expect to have another great time as well. We hope you will be able to come and join us.

Our readings this summer have been from Genesis the first book of the Old Testament. We have been hearing about Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. In August we will continue with Jacob and then move on with the story of Joseph. These men and their wives were pivotal in the founding history of the Jewish nation and as such were pivotal in their influence to us as followers of Jesus. The reason they were and still today are so important is because of their faith and relationship with God. Abraham is known as the father of faith because he believed God when God told him that God would make him a mighty nation with descendants as many as the stars in the heavens. At the time Abraham was in his seventies and Sarah his wife (in her 60's) was barren and had been unable to have children. Yet Abraham believed God would somehow do it. In fact God did, but it was almost thirty years later. Abraham still believed all those years. As if those 30 years of waiting were not test enough, when Isaac was somewhere between 12 and 15, God told Abraham to sacrifice Isaac as a human sacrifice on Mount Moriah. Yet. because Abraham so trusted God and so believed what God had promised him that he thought God would somehow raise Isaac back from the dead. This is the kind of faith and trust in God Abraham had. Isaac and Jacob had faith too. We hear more about the faith of Jacob in his stories and his faith was more like ours. He tries to deal with God and says things like, "If you will protect me and bless me and bring me safely through everything, THEN I will serve you and give you 10 percent of all that I have." Jacob said that after he had seen the stairway up to heaven and heard God speak to him. As time goes on though Jacob comes to know God and to love and trust Him.

These stories we hear in our readings are wonderful pictures of how God has faithfully dealt with His people in the past. We don't have time to go through all those stories and explain them in our services but I hope you will take the time to read them on your own. I recommend starting with the story of Abraham which begins in Genesis chapter 12 and reading through Abraham's life adventures. Then read about Isaac, Rebecca, Esau and Jacob—now that family had some issues! Then Jacob's life is also a story filled with God's actions and help. Through it all, remember that this God is our God. And He loves us. Remember that when God had Abraham look up and realize that his descendants would be as many as those stars, God was looking ahead in history and counting you and me as some of those stars, some of Abraham's descendants. So we are part of God's fulfilling His promise to Abraham.

I hope that during August like Abraham, Isaac and Jacob you will experience God's presence in your lives more and more.

Saint Laurence

This month on August 10th we commemorate the life of a fellow named Laurence. He was known as the Laurence the Deacon. He was martyred during the persecution initiated in 257 by Emperor Valerian. Christians were persecuted by the Romans over the vears for several reasons. The first reason was for treason, that is, that Christians said that Jesus was Lord thus supplanting Caesar as Lord. This was treason. The second reason Christians were persecuted was because they were accused of cannibalism. It was said that they ate the body of drank the blood of a sacrificed man. (We do this of course during Holy Communion.) The Communion rite was misunderstood and Christians were hated and despised because of this practice. And then also they were accused of incest. Christians married their sisters or their brothers. This accusation came from the practice of calling fellow Christians brother or sister.

This particular persecution under Valerian was aimed primarily at the clergy and the laity of the upper classes. During this time all properties of the church were confiscated and assemblies of the church were forbidden. On August 4th 258 Pope Sextus the 2nd and his seven deacons were arrested in the Roman catacombs. They were all summarily executed except for the archdeacon Laurence. Laurence was brought out and questioned by the prefect. In the early days of the church the deacons were the ones who oversaw the monies of the church to make sure that the poor were cared for so the Roman authorities wanted Laurence to tell them where all the church money was. Laurence in reply assembled the sick and the poor to whom, as archdeacon he had

distributed the church's relief funds and then he presented them to the prefect "These are saving. treasures of the Church." In response the Roman prefect had Laurence roasted alive on a gridiron on August 10th. Laurence had been much loved because of the love and compassion he had shown for the poor and unfortunate. After Laurence's death other Christians were encouraged to keep the faith no matter what with the saving, "Live with Christ and Laurence."

The Greek word from which we get our English word 'martyr' simply means 'witness' but in the age of persecutions a martyr came to mean one who had witnessed that Jesus is Lord even to death.

Even though you and I are not under the threat of death because of our faith in Jesus, still let us take encouragement from men like Laurence to be bold to witness for our Lord Jesus.


