

FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Members & Friends of St. Andrew's,

In the church calendar June, July, and August have something in common. They are all the same season, the season after Pentecost. We know this season as Ordinary Time or Feria Time or simply the "green" season because the liturgical color is green. Ordinary and Feria refer to the fact that those Sundays after Pentecost are not holy days celebrating something in particular, they are ordinary Sundays. And this is the *green* season because it is during this season we buckle down as Christians and grow!

How do we buckle down and grow? Can plants make themselves grow any faster? No, plants do not have speeds per se, but we can do things to encourage growth; or, if we do not do these things, we will discourage growth. Just like a plant needs moisture, sun, and nourishment to grow, there are things we need spiritually in order to grow as well.

First, we need to continue to hear God's Word explained and applied to our lives, we need to worship God with God's people, and we need to participate in Holy Communion on a regular basis—therefore we need to continue to go to church even if we are on vacation!

Secondly, we need to continue to read and think about the Scriptures. If you are not reading the Bible on a regular basis, you should be. If you do not know what to read, the current Lectionary readings are Matthew and Romans. So try reading through those books this summer. If you finish them, read the next books. If you have questions while you are reading, write them down, email them to me and we will start up a dialogue—it will be fun!

Attend church, read your Bible, and of course, the third main thing is to pray! Talk .to God about what you hear in church; talk to God about what you are reading in

the Bible, talk to God about your problems and talk to him on behalf of other people's problems. And learn to thank God for the good things he has done for you and given you. Prayer is on-going communication with God.

Finally, in order to grow we need to practice what we have learned. The Bible tells us not to be hearers only of the Word but doers also. We need to serve God, therefore if you are not already doing so, find some way to serve him. We need to give back to God: try to give ten percent of your earnings back to God, which is the tithe referred to in the Bible. As I have said before, we do the serving and the giving because we need to be able to serve and we need to be able to give—if we cannot, then it shows we are too in-grown. God wants us to be able to see beyond ourselves; he wants us to learn to trust him too.

If we do these things, we will indeed grow more spiritually healthy this green season! May God bless you as you grow. I am looking forward to seeing you in church!

Sunday School Director Susan Villnow thanked each student individually, remarking on what each child contributed to the group's sharing and learning throughout the past program year.

Baccalaureate Service Rains Hope

Rains? More like a torrential downpour! Despite intense weather, about 75 graduating seniors from Nature Coast Technical High School (NCTHS), including our own **Brittney Traudt**, gathered at St. Andrew's with families and friends to celebrate a truly moving baccalaureate service on Thursday, May 29. It was the night before graduation. The soon-to-be-graduates were decked out in caps and gowns and winning smiles. It was literally standing room only in our Sanctuary. With drums, guitar and piano, four graduating seniors—including pianist Shanelle Wilson and vocalist Alyssa Kirby—led the worship music. Song lyrics were projected onto one wall. The keynote message was delivered by The Rev. Paul Castelli of Crosspoint

Church. The benediction was given by The Rev. Dr. Gregory Champagne, pastor of New Journey Church and NCTHS social studies teacher. Brittney offered the Prayer of Dedication. There was a personal testimony by senior Kassie Kennedy, responsive readings and scripture readings. The NCTHS chorus sang the Benediction song.

What a blessing to see so many young lives celebrating Jesus as they prepare to go out into the world as young adults!

Eucharist at the Beach Saves a Life

On Sunday June 1, **Deacon Elaine Cole** officiated at our annual worship service at Pine Island beach. **Tim Audette** led the music with his guitar and strong voice.

Brittney Traudt delivered a homily about being in difficult situations and how God's hand can help us through. Who knew that shortly thereafter, two of our young people would find themselves in such a situation?

After worship it was time for hot dogs, burgers & side dishes, followed by the much anticipated swim in the Gulf. Not long into the fun in the surf and sun, a cry for help was heard. A man was struggling unsuccessfully to bring a lifeless young boy, maybe 8 years old, to shore. The boy had somehow swum way out to a sandbar.

Tim Audette sprang into action. He swam out, scooped up the child and returned him to the shore. **Derek Newman**, a certified lifeguard, dialed 9-1-1 and, along with a nurse who God placed on the beach that day, implemented lifesaving measures.

After Derek positioned him on his side, the boy coughed up water and began to breathe again! Derek continued to supervise his care until paramedics arrived. The boy was Bay-flighted to All Children's Hospital in Tampa. Sheriff Al Nienhuis said later that afternoon he seemed to be doing okay.

God surely had his hand in the planning and timing of the day! As the boy was taken away, everyone held hands and Deacon Elaine led them in prayer.

Eagle Scout Court of Honor

Also on Sunday June 1, we proudly watched **Joseph Balcolm** become an Eagle Scout. What a privilege to have been invited by Troup 433 to share in this experience! **Fr. Mike Bedrosian** gave the invocation. From the entrance of the honor guard to the narration of "The Voice of the Eagle," to watching Joseph receive his Eagle pin and him pinning a miniature Eagle pin on his Mom; to commendations and presentations in-



cluding those by County Commissioner Diane Rowden and Police Chief Al Nienhuis; the ceremony was packed with emotion and, at least for this writer, with enlightenment on just how much work, pride and sacrifice go into an *Eagle* project. At only 16 years old, Joseph has many more opportunities to bring honor to his troop; no doubt he will continue to make an impact on his community throughout his lifetime.

God Bless America

Thanks to **Mark Traudt** for keeping us aware of our Soldiers and Veterans and the ways we can help—and thank—they.

We recently celebrated **Memorial Day**. On Friday **June 6th** our country remembered the **70th Anniversary** of the WW II **D-Day invasion of Normandy**, France. The largest amphibious invasion to ever take place, this battle saw over 425,000 allied and German soldiers killed, wounded or missing. So many souls gave their lives in defense of freedom on that day and on many, many others.

Besides D-Day, over the Summer we will celebrate **Flag Day** on **June 14** and **Independence Day** on **July Fourth**. In the Fall it will be **Veteran's Day**. As we spend time with our loved ones, friends, co-workers, neighbors and strangers over the Summer months, let's remember all those who have not only sacrificed the time they could have spent with us (many losing their lives in the process), but also those who continue to fight very different, ongoing battles even after they return home. These are our service people who suffer with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, loneliness, depression, thoughts of suicide, and/or physical injuries including amputation of limbs, the inability to walk or move without pain, those who are paralyzed or have brain injuries, the unemployed or homeless . . . and the list goes on. Yes, many good men and women have sacrificed to ensure our freedom, because they believe in the American way of life. On this page we've highlighted a few of the many programs that do what they can to help our beloved Veterans. God Bless our country and all who serve and have served to keep it the Land of the Free!



The **Honor Flight Network** (www.honorflight.org) honors America's veterans for all their sacrifices by transporting our heroes to Washington, D.C. to visit and reflect at **their** memorials. Top priority is given to the senior veterans – World War II survivors, along with other veterans who may be terminally ill.



The mission of the **Wounded Warrior Project** (www.woundedwarriorproject.org) is to honor and empower veterans, service members and their families who incurred a physical or mental injury, illness, or wound coincident to their military service on or after September 11, 2001. Programs include combat stress recovery, long-term support, physical health & wellness, economic empowerment (transitional employment training) and engagement through peer support. They use a holistic approach to nurture mind and body.

Wreaths Across America (www.wreathscrossamerica.org) has a three-fold mission: to Remember, Honor & Teach. They coordinate wreath laying ceremonies in December at Arlington National Cemetery as well as at Veterans' cemeteries and other locations in all 50 states and beyond. They also organize a week of events including international Veteran tributes, ceremonies at State Houses and a week-long "Veteran's Parade" from Maine to Virginia, stopping along the way to spread their message about the importance of remembering our fallen heroes, honoring those who serve, and teaching our children the sacrifices made by Veterans and their families to preserve our freedoms. They receive no government funding. The week of events is made possible through thousands of volunteers, individual wreath sponsors, corporate donors and volunteer truckers. They also coordinate Veteran services and recognition through a variety of programs, and provide schools with teaching aides for projects throughout the year.

Stop Soldier Suicide (<http://stopsoldiersuicide.org/>) is an organization of Veterans who understand the military mindset and training who work to raise awareness of the issues and to implement a triage approach to help veterans in distress, bringing fellow Veterans and Soldiers back from the edge. According to their website, we face a tidal wave of military suicides as more and more servicemen and women come home. Every day 22+ Veterans and 1 Active Soldier take their own lives. Burdened with the stigma associated with mental health issues and the military "shame" surrounding PTS (Post Traumatic Stress), they instead turn to suicide as their only option to relieve suffering. Stop Soldier Suicide supports their brothers and sisters in arms in their greatest hour of need. If you are in crisis, please call the Veterans Crisis Line at 1.800.273.8255.



Flag Day commemorates the adoption of the U.S. flag on **June 14, 1777** by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. June 14 is also the Army Birthday (on June 14, 1775, Congress adopted the "American Continental Army"). In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation officially establishing June 14 as Flag Day; in August 1949, *National Flag Day* was established by an Act of Congress. Flag Day is not an official Federal holiday—but **don't forget to fly the red, white and blue on June 14th!**



If you need or know of a fellow parishioner that could benefit from this ministry please call the church office.





July's Guest Pastor



The Rev. Dr. Thomas Williams will be St. Andrew's guest priest for the month of July while Fr. Lance is on vacation. He is

Professor and Chair of Religious Studies and Professor of Philosophy at the University of South Florida, and is an assisting priest at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Tampa.

His academic specialty is medieval Christian thought, and he has published works that focus especially on St Anselm of Canterbury and John Duns Scotus.

Born in Memphis, he was brought up in Southern Baptist churches but was drawn into the Episcopal Church in high school.

He studied piano from the age of four

through high school. In college he started playing the organ, mainly because the campus Episcopal chapel needed an organist and his piano skills were the closest thing available. Presently he prefers to mostly sing, including choral evensong as a member of the Chamber Choir at the Cathedral in St Petersburg.

Rev. Williams received a BA in Philosophy from Vanderbilt University in 1988 and Ph.D. in Philosophy from the University of Notre Dame in 1994. He taught for two years at Creighton University in Omaha before moving to the University of Iowa. He was ordained in Iowa City in 2008. He joined the USF faculty in 2005, moving to Tampa in 2006.

In addition to serving at St Mark's, Tampa, he has done extended supply work at Holy Trinity, Clearwater, and been a clergy fellow in residence at St. Paul's, K Street. He has twice been a supply priest for St. Andrew's in Spring Hill during the time we were searching for a new rector.

Please welcome Fr. Williams when you meet him in July. We look forward to having him back with us!
