FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Members & Friends of St. Andrew's,

Although Easter Sunday is now behind us, we are still in the season of Easter and will be for most of the month of May. Every time we have Holy Communion in this season I say or chant the proper preface for Easter. This comes at the beginning of Holy Communion right after you say, "It is right to give him thanks and praise." I say a few more words and then the following: "But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life."

This is a remarkable prayer. We say here that of all the things for which we praise God, and of course, there are very many, the chief thing is for the glorious resurrection of Jesus Christ. Typically we thank and praise God for our daily food. We thank and praise God for health and his help throughout our days. We thank and praise God for our family and friends. We thank and praise God for our homes, our jobs, and our community. But do we really thank God for the resurrection of Jesus Christ? I mean outside of church? If in fact, it is the chief thing for which we praise God we really ought to be thanking him and praising Him for it even outside of church.

I think one reason we typically do not praise and thank God for the resurrection is that we simply take it for granted. It is an historical fact. It is something we had nothing to do with, and it seems that it has nothing to do with us now. And I suppose in a since that is right. We had nothing to do with the resurrection any more than we

had anything to do with our own physical birth. But in the same way we ought not to take our own lives for granted but we ought to be thankful for our creation; in that same way we need to remember what God did for us in and through the resurrection of Jesus Christ and be thankful.

It is through the resurrection that we have peace with God—we have been reconciled with God; our sins are no longer between God and us. (Jesus is the true Paschal Lamb who died for our sins.) We also have been made into new people, a new creation through Jesus Christ and his resurrection. We have this new life which is an eternal life again through his resurrection. Do you see where this leads? Everything about our Christian life is dependent upon the resurrection of Jesus Christ. THAT is why we are chiefly bound, obligated, to praise God for the resurrection.

This is one of the main reasons that during this season we say, Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia! Because it is this season we especially remember and thank God for glorious resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

You may notice something new in the church, the screens for our projection system have been installed. So it should not be long before the projectors are up and we'll be off and running!! Of course it will take a little bit of time to do some adjusting and tweaking.

As you all know, in my past Chimes articles, I've closed almost every time with "we are moving forward with the New Addition." I know that despite that some of our parishioners are wondering, "Hey, what's going on?" So, here is a brief history of what has happened and what is going on right now. About 15 months ago Fr. with him. We spent quite a bit of time meeting and talking with him. We got some great ideas and some very helpful drawings. Things seemed to be going really well. However, we came to find out that he had misrepresented a few things about his qualifications as both an architect and a contractor. After a Building Committee was formed, with Grant Tolbert, John Crouse and Pete Jackson they became aware that something was amiss with the drawings and the price. The person we had been working with became angry, to the point of threatening legal action, and decided he no longer wanted to be involved. This put us back at square one, it was also very disheartening. However it became another indicator that The Lord was watching over St. Andrew's, as the person we were working with and a couple of the contractors he used went bankrupt! This could have been a disaster for St. Andrew's. We may have ended up with a partly done project or even something worse. So, The Lord was truly watching over us.

As we stand now, we have 2 legitimate bids from 2 local area contractors. We also had 2 contractors that said the job was too small for them. As of the last Vestry meeting we have chosen the one we'd like to work with. I will let Fr. Lance bring the details to the Congregation.

OUR ADDITION: MOVING FORWARD

Dear Friends.

Have you ever heard the phrase, "one step forward, two steps back?" Well, this is how I feel about the progress of the addition for our church. Or at least how I felt it was progressing, but now it is more like "two steps forward—one step back."

As most of you remember, I came to the church a little more than a year ago asking for your support to build an addition to the church. This addition was to build a room in the area where one of the fountains is located, the one on the east side of the bridge. This addition would also enclose the narthex area and provide a much-needed renovation for the

bathrooms and even add another bathroom which would be wheel-chair accessible. The designer who had drawn up the plans told me and our vestry that this project could be accomplished for \$87,000. This is the information I brought before you and asked your permission to refinance our existing loan for Krysher Hall and combine the two, making the monthly payment less than what we were currently paying. The amount included money which had already been raised. You, the members of the church accepted this and while the vote was not unanimous more than 90 percent of the congregation was in favor of the project.

We were ready to rock and roll! The vestry and I established a construction committee including Grant Tolbert, John Crouse, and Pete Jackson. As per Diocesan guidelines the construction committee put this project out for public bid. When we did this, though, the man who designed our addition, instead of submitting his bid took us into litigation. We are still uncertain why. We spent a number of months in negotiation between his lawyer and our diocesan lawyer but finally at the end of January, 2015, we agreed on an amount to pay him of \$4001.00 for the plans he made for us and sent him the check. So then it was back to getting bids again!

Now we have our bids. That is the good news. But the bad news is that they are much higher than the \$87,000 the first person had told us. The lowest bid is around \$150,000. We currently have \$110,000 set aside for this project. This amount was wonderful when we thought we needed \$87,000. But now with the estimated costs of \$150,000, we are \$40,000 short. I will be returning to the congregation to ask for your permission to go forward with this project. The ground shifted underneath us and I do not want to try to go forward without providing you with the full informa-

tion regarding the changes in the cost of the project and once again asking for your full approval.

When we first started talking about this project a year and half ago, we raised over \$45,000 without a capital fund drive; people simply gave over and above their normal giving. We had dollar gifts of tens, twenty-fives, hundreds, and even thousands. It was truly amazing and exciting. I am coming to you again for this kind of help. Would you please prayerfully consider whether you would be able to contribute towards this project again?

Once again, these are the reasons we would like this addition:

Primary purpose of the project:

To make our church more young-family friendly: In today's world young families do not typically drop their babies or very young ones off in another building. I would like to have a place attached so young moms and dads (or grandmothers and grandfathers) can bring a fussy child into a room adjoining the church and still feel part of the service while their child would be able to move around and make noise, without distracting or disturbing those around them.

Secondary purposes:

- 1. Having an enclosed narthex will enable us to converse freely without disturbing those folks who are praying before the service in an air-conditioned environment. With our hot, muggy days, people right now are anxious to get out of the heat (or chill, or wet) to get into the coolness of the church.
- An enclosed narthex will also enable us to leave literature, nametags, and notices out without being ruined by our Florida weather.
- Bathrooms are in desperate need to be renovated and they are embarrassing to have visitors use. Currently our bath-
