FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

November is traditionally a month of thankfulness. We begin it with thankfulness and then we conclude it with thankfulness.

On November 2nd, we observe the Commemoration of All Faithful Departed, also known as All Souls' Day. It is on this day we make a point of remembering those who have passed into the nearer presence of the Lord. And although we simply say their names in the service, it is a time for us to remember and be thankful for their lives. Typically we remember things about their lives when we have the funeral services, but it is over the days and weeks and months and even the years that pass that things come to mind about those dearly departed that come to mind. Those memories may make us smile, even laugh, or they may tug at our hearts. On All Souls' Day we gather those memories up again and thank God for letting us have the time with our departed loved ones that we did.

And then at the end of the month there is the grand Thanksgiving Day itself. Unfortunately for many of us we really do not spend much time being thankful. We are too busy. We have food to eat and games to watch and family and friends with whom to visit. While each of those activities is certainly wonderful, we need to make sure that we do not lose the opportunity to utilize the day for its real purpose. Did you know that in the Bible one of the main faults God found with his people the Israelites was that they were not thankful? We are told over and over again to be thankful both in the Old Testament and in the New Testament. Is this command given to us because somehow God needs our thanks?

No, God wants us to have thankful hearts which is the primary source for joy. If you and I want to have joy and happiness, then we need to learn to be thankful. And look, we have a whole day set aside for that very purpose!

This month, the Commemoration of All Faithful Departed service is on November 3rd at 11 AM in the Memorial Garden. We will also have a Eucharist on Thanksgiving Day at 10 AM. If you are able to come a bit early you will have a perfect place and opportunity to quietly give thanks to God for his blessings to you this past year.

God is so good to us; he is good to us because he loves us. My prayer for all of us this November is that we will learn to be more and more thankful to our loving Heavenly Father.

Sr. Warden's Remarks 2015 Southwest Florida **Convention Report**

The 47th annual Convention of The Episcopal Diocese of SW Florida was attended by Craig and Glee Gates, Barbara Ingram, and Fr. Lance and Diane Wallace. The convention provided continuing education, a celebration of ministries, diocesan business and worship that assembled hundreds of Episcopalians together as one. The ministry fair consisted of many exhibits, demonstrations and handmade items for sale to help raise awareness and funds for a variety of Episcopal causes.

The various workshops offered a chance to learn new skills, introduced new ministries, and provided fresh ideas and wider views of how we as Christians can transition positively in times of change.

This year's theme was "Mercy in Mission: Healing a Hurting World." It highlighted the 75th anniversary of Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD). The thread of this theme wound throughout the entire session. Healing, as it took place in individuals, healing for renewed life in our congregations and the healing that Christians are

providing throughout our troubled world. Guest speaker Abagail Nelson, Sr. V.P. for ERD, shared her experiences working throughout Africa, Asia, Latin America and the US responding to disasters, alleviating hunger, fighting disease and providing training for self-sufficiency.

The keynote speaker was Brian McLaren, an author, activist and innovative major figure in Christian thinking. He shared his knowledge and experience mentoring church leaders, affecting changes in the Episcopal church, in Christianity, and in faith and social justice. He spoke about the Episcopal church's need to adapt and consider new ways to show the gospel of our Lord Jesus to a world in need.

Due to illness, Bishop Dabney Smith provided a videotaped message. In his message he encouraged each of us to continue our work as healers in all aspects of the church community and the world.

The convention closed with voting on resolutions, elections to fill various seats, approval of the budget and welcoming a new church in our diocese. There were fortunately no contentious resolutions or elections. All in all it was a good convention. Thank you for sending us! *In Christ*,

We as a delegation considered how we could implement the Bishop's call to new ways for mission here in Spring Hill. One idea was to begin a prayer ministry for our neighborhood. We would send out a couple of teams to houses in our neighborhood. At each house we would introduce ourselves and ask if they had any prayer requests they would like us as a church to pray about. If they had none, that would be fine, we would simply leave, inviting them—if they do not attend another church—to visit us. If they had a prayer request we would write it down and give it to our prayer team. Our prayer team would pray for all prayer requests brought in. I would also like to hand out prayer request forms to our pre-school families. I believe as people see God answering their prayer requests they will be stirred to come to learn about Him.

As Episcopalians we know how to pray, so this is a ministry that fits us perfectly. As a church in order to do this ministry, we must have a prayer team in place. We need a group of people willing to commit to pray for these prayer requests for two weeks. One doesn't need to be young and

active—although the young and active can certainly pray too. This is a ministry that every single person in our church can do. If you are willing to sign up for this prayer team, please contact Trish at our church office (352-683-2010) so that as we receive our prayer requests we can get them to you.

I am very excited about bringing Christ to our neighborhood! I hope you will prayerfully consider joining this ministry. Also, if you are willing to join me on a Saturday afternoon and walk around our neighborhood to get the requests, please let me know that as well. *Warmly in Christ*,




