FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

November has been a great month! We had a wonderful Canterbury Festival, thank you Deb Smith for organizing and overseeing such a marvelous event. There were many, many volunteers from church, from each of our congregations who were here and helped. It was wonderful to see all of you together. And it appears that Canterbury Festival brought in more than \$4000 for us to use for more outreach! Then Bishop Garrison was here on the 22nd to receive and confirm twelve more people into our church! We then had a great celebratory meal in Krysher Hall with over one hundred fifty people in attendance! It was great! Thank you, Loa Jackson for overseeing this massive production and clean-up. Also thanks to Thousand Island Café for cooking such delicious food.

We are now in another new Christian year! We are in the season of looking forward to the coming of Jesus and this season is called, appropriately enough, Advent, which means 'arrival.' This has a double meaning, doesn't it? On the one hand, we look for the arrival of Christ in his birth so many years ago and the celebration of that on Christmas Day. On the other hand, we look for the arrival of Christ and his second coming at the end of the world. As Christians we believe that he will return, end this world as we know it, and usher in a new age of God's kingdom. So we have two intertwined themes running through this season. We have the theme of joy that the Christ has come to the world to save humanity. We also have the theme of penance. This is the time we look at our lives anew and try to ready ourselves for the second-coming of Jesus. We want to be prepared so that when he appears we will not be ashamed of ourselves and our actions. So we will see

both themes in our readings this season. On the first Sunday of Advent in the Gospel reading we hear Jesus talk about when he returns again and the importance of being ready. The second Sunday we hear readings about the ministry of John the Baptist where he begins his preaching ministry with, "Prepare ye the way of the Lord." The third Sunday, also called Rose Sunday, we hear again about John but there is a turn—now there is excitement in the air that the King is almost here—now the penance is turning to joy and anticipation. Then on the fourth Sunday we have Mary's song of joy, the Magnificat, it is a song of not only joy but exultation, of triumph! So we see the change in tone as it were from the darkness before the dawn in the first two Sundays to the sky slowly lighting to

the brilliance of the sun breaking over the horizon. What a joy for us to experience this again in our new Christian year.

I look forward to experiencing this new season and this New Year with all of you!

Hello Fellow Church Members,

Convention Reflections

Our Recent Diocesan Convention in Punta Gorda was well attended by hosts of Delegates from various churches. I (we) get to meet old friends and make new ones, like members of the Daughters of the King, Cursillo and the Order of St. Luke.

I was very privileged to attend Convention as a delegate representing St. Andrew's. It was very educational regarding things we should do and be aware of concerning our church and congregations.

I attended three workshops which are vital for our church's growth: Disaster Planning, The Christian Faith of the Future, and Going Through: Navigating Your Church in Times of Change

I chose to reflect on the workshop "Going Through: Navigating Change" or as Jesus says, "Let us cross over." (Mark 4:35). Here is the workshop overview from the convention's printed program, followed by my reflections:

Overview

When challenges come to your church, such as financial obstacles and cultural shifts, how does your church go through these times of change? Transition is crucial for renewed life in a congregation and it brings out either the positive or the negative witness story of a church. What is your witness as a congregation? Jesus says, "Let us cross over" (Mark 4:35). If healing is foundational in the church, not an afterthought, it becomes the navigational tool through the transitional time, bringing the whole church (corporately and individually) through these challenging times, intact and transformed. Let us cross over together.

Presenters: The Rev. Doug Scharf, Rector, Holy Innocents, Valrico; the Rev. Dr. Sharon Lewis, Amazing Love Healing Ministries

Reflection

Crossing over seems difficult at a glance. It's like when you are going through some problems in life and you are afraid of facing them. But Jesus came along and said, "Fear not for I am with you." Crossing over is God leading his people through the waters of redemption to a new life and hope. Being a member of the Order of St. Luke, this subject is not difficult to grasp for it is part of our teaching to hold strongly to our beliefs in this matter. First, we should cleanse our souls and turn to God for guidance. The Church should have all members pray to God and seek his help. This task is the responsibility of us all, though in some instances Vestry members in particular will pray for specific purposes.

Healing is a natural function of our Church. Healing prayer during worship becomes part of our commitment to our congregation that they have a place to get the help they need for any adversities in their lives. May we continue in our faith as believers in Christ.

DIOCESE YOUTH NEWS

Youth Leadership Team Listens for God's Spirit; Strengthens Existing Youth Ministries

Youth Leadership Team (formerly Diocesan Youth Council) began in April 2015 and will serve until May, 2016. Consisting of 20 youth and 17 adults from across the diocese, YLT will focus on but not be limited to the following 5 primary goals:

- To listen for the leading of God's Spirit (vision) in order to develop leadership and community among young people and other adults in this Diocese.
- 2. For youth and adults to work together in collaborative leadership to shape, form and lead youth ministry in the Diocese.
- 3. To provide, organize and implement activities and programs that help youth and adults grow in Christ and to support and enhance spiritual growth in each congregation.
- 4. To continue to support and strengthen existing Diocesan youth ministries specifically: New Beginnings, Happening, DaySpring Summer Camp and the fall Acolyte Festival.
- 5. To be a "listening heart and discerning spirit" for the desires, needs and requests of youth, adult leaders, Clergy and lay leadership in regard to spiritual growth and the raising up of the gifts of young people.

The group is divided into four teams that are developing and leading in these areas of ministry:

Music - Finding and developing musicians and music for all youth events, especially *Happening* and *New Beginnings*.

Episcopal Cheerleaders - Creating and developing all forms of communication and building connections with youth, adults and congregations throughout the diocese.

New Beginnings - Continuing to find new ways to enrich and enhance this wonderful program for middle schoolers.

New Events - Designing a new diocesanwide youth event to be held January 2016.

Reflections on a Collect

Reprinted from Fr. Lance's Weekly Email of Nov. 13, 2015

This week our collect is one of my favorites. Now they are all good of course, but this one I like especially. This weekend we will pray together, "Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ."

It is one of those things of which I always need to be reminded. I need to not only hear and read Scriptures, but I need to mark, learn, and inwardly digest them.

What does it mean to *mark?* It means to take note. So as I read or listen to Scripture I need to be paying attention to how it might apply to my thinking and to how I act.

Learning refers to putting something into practice. Many years ago as a gymnast in high school, I practiced certain moves until I had them learned, that is, until I was able to actually insert them smoothly into my routine. That is what learning here means. It is not simply a general sort of knowledge about something; it is being able to do it.

So I have marked certain Scriptures, learned Scriptures, and now I am to *imvardly digest* them. What in the world does that mean? Well, just like when we eat our food, it needs to be digested in order for it to do our bodies any good. The food needs to become part of us. The same thing is true with Scripture. It needs to become part of our lives. We need to think it and act it. As we do this with God's Word, we see our faith grow stronger and our walk with Jesus grow closer. What a great prayer this is for all of us.
