FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

There is a house that I pass on the way home that has all kinds of Christmas lights and decorations in the yard. And one of the decorations is a large, lighted, probably 3 or 4 feet high, 2016. It is a little jarring to me. It is always a little odd moving from one year to the next. Years are markers, milestones if you will. The human race has observed two thousand and fifteen years since, since well, the birth of Christ. Nowadays in our society, when we write our year typically we will put 2016 C.E. This stands for Common Era. The Common Era began two thousand and sixteen year ago. We used to use the initials, A.D. after our years. The A.D. stood for some Latin words, Anno Domini, that is, the year of our Lord. So the expression insinuates that since Jesus has been born two thousand sixteen years ago, every year is his. All of human history is marked as either before or after his life. As our society has grown more secular however we no longer mark our years with the A.D.; now we use the C.E.

But this year at St. Andrew's we are not going to have a 2016 C.E. We are going to have a 2016 A.D. It will not simply be another year in our common era. This year is going to be marked as the Lord's year! We, by His help and grace will get our addition built. We will by His help and grace continue to grow in numbers and serve God more in our church and community. We will by His grace and help continue to grow closer to God through our prayers and Bible studies. It is going to be a great Anno_domini!

And 2015 was an A.D. year as well. We did not get our addition built and I along with most of you hoped and thought that we would. Unfortunately we encountered many obstacles; some were expected but most were unexpected. Yet they were all overcome with the Lord's help and it looks like we will be able to break ground in January. This past year fifteen members of our church went to be with the Lord. We will miss them all. Some of them were very active in our church life and their absence is keenly felt. Yet, this year in March and November Bishop Garrison received seventeen new members and over the year we transferred in 17 more members.

We added the projectors and screens and are using them to enhance our worship services. We had a leaky flat roof over the sacristy and we reroofed and replaced the flat with a pitched roof. So now our Altar Guild and Lay Eucharist Ministers will not need to jump over the buckets anymore. We have made other improvements and beautified our campus.

God has been very good to us. We have tried to be faithful stewards of his goodness as well. We gave over \$10,000 to outreach ministries in our community, our diocese and even to some world-wide ministries as well. We hope to be able to have enough extra at the end of this year to do this again.

I am looking forward to seeing you all in church and at our church birthday party on January 10th and at our annual meeting on January 31st! So we begin 2016 A.D. with anticipation and hopeful and grateful

VESTRY NOMINEES 2016

Vestry members will be elected at the Annual Meeting on **Sunday, January 31**st. There are two (2) Two-Year Positions open, and three (3) Three-Year Positions open. Vestry members must be confirmed or received, and full members of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church. They must be regular in attendance, faithful in stewardship of time, talent and resources, and able to attend monthly vestry meetings. They must also be available for the Vestry Orientation Retreat the first weekend in February.

The following persons (listed alphabetically) have agreed to run for a Two-Year position on the vestry:

Norman Neill & Rita Watson-Trapp. You will be asked to vote for two.

The following persons (listed alphabetically) have agreed to run for a Three-Year position: **Jeannette Mott (Janie) Fritz, Michelle Traudt, Hal Smith & Carolyn Wallner.** You will be asked to vote for 3 of these 4 candidates.

Following are the Questionnaire submissions from each candidate:

Question 1: Why do you want to serve as a Vestry member of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church?

Carolyn Wallner: As a member of the Vestry I would like the opportunity to continue to serve another term. I feel that during this time of growth and construction a continuity of leadership is important. Many decisions will need to be made during the next several months and years – and knowing the background and history of the issues is important.

Norman Neill: I feel I have a lot to offer St. Andrew's now and in the future.

Rita Watson-Trapp: Being on the Vestry for this year is very interesting and I would like to complete a full term.

Hal Smith: When my wife and I retired to Spring Hill, we began our search for a church where we could serve not only the church but the community. We have found such a place at St. Andrew's. We began our participation with spring cleanup as a way to meet other members and be of service. Since becoming members, I have had the privilege of serving as usher, greeter, and computer operator. My wife and I help with the Back-Pack (Weekend Blessings) outreach program for kids. I was involved in the Canterbury Festival and was allowed to play St. Nicholas in the Christmas program. All of these activities are done with pleasure as St. Andrew's has become our home.

Michelle Traudt: I'd like to be a voice/representative for the youth and the younger families that attend the church.

Jeannette Mott Fritz (Janie): After having discussed this opportunity with several people, and doing a lot of praying about it, I thought I might be able to offer myself for this position to help our church grow, both in love and caring, and in other aspects of church life where I might be needed.

Question 2: What are your qualifications for this position?

Carolyn Wallner: I have served as a member of the Vestry for three years. I serve as a Lay Eucharistic Minister, am co-chair of the Weekend Blessings Backpack Ministry, am an active member of the Daughters of the King, and also am part of the Cooking Team Ministry along with other activities in the church.

Norman Neill: I was on the Vestry for several years and served as Jr. Warden for two years at St Mary's Lake Romkonkoma in New York. I am a life member of the Farmingville Fire Dept. being a member for fifty years and attaining the rank of Chief of Dept. After leaving this office I was elected to the board of fire commissioners. Our duties included overseeing a three million budget, hiring and overseeing our paid employees, purchasing and maintaining fire and EMS equipment and maintaining buildings and grounds. I served on the board for 25 years. I left the board due to moving to Florida.

Rita Watson-Trapp: I served on the Vestry for one year. At work I'm part of a team where we meet often and work together to provide Head Start Children the services they need.

Hal Smith: I am a retired Lieutenant Colonel in the Army and a retired school teacher/administrator. I have led men and women throughout both careers. In my military career, I was responsible for leading men and women in the accomplishment of our mission as well as seeing these men and women achieve their personal goals. As a teacher and administrator I was responsible for setting goals and objectives for our organization then setting the tone of each task as a way to meet those goals and standards. As a teacher, my successes were my students; many of whom were extremely successful in their chosen careers. In both careers, I have learned the importance of building consensus, prioritizing goals and maintaining standards. Creating such an environment allows for maximization of ideas, building consensus so that all ideas are appreciated, and utilization of resources in meeting established goals. I will bring to this organization the same passion that I feel for continued growth at St. Andrew's.

Michelle Traudt: I am finishing up my first year on the vestry and it has been a wonderful and positive experience. I am open minded and willing to listen to and understand the concerns of the entire congregation. Previously, I served on the board of the Mother's Club of Hernando County for 7 years. The Mother's Club was a group of moms who came together to find friendship for themselves and their children; to support each other, and to give back to our community, by collecting food, clothes, supplies and volunteering time to local organizations.

Jeannette Mott Fritz (Janie): I am a cradle Episcopalian, as were both my parents and grandparents. During my adult life, I have been lucky enough to have lived in many places with my husband Tom. He was in the US Navy for 36 years, where I became active in the Officers' Wives Clubs, eventually serving as the representative to the United States Naval Station Command in Rota, Spain. When Tom became the Commanding Officer of his Squadron there, I became the president of the OWC. My experiences in these activities were extensive, and included being the 'mother hen' to hundreds of wives. After we returned to the United States, I fulfilled a long-held dream of becoming a Registered Nurse. I worked in the hospital setting and was elected to the Board of Directors as the employee representative to the Civista Health Foundation in our Hospital. It was there I gained more experience in the directing and planning for hospital-wide, as well as community-wide, involvement in our fund-raising efforts for our hospital community. I currently serve as a counter on the financial committee, and have served our church, as requested, as a member of other groups.

Question 3: Tell us a little about yourself and your faith:


