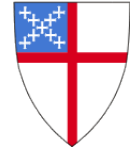

From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Once again summer is officially over and we are moving into a new program year. We will begin our Sunday School on Kick-off Sunday, September 10th and then on Wednesday the 13th the Youth Group will begin meeting again as well. Adult Bible Study also will resume on the 13th and we will begin studying this year the Gospel According to Matthew! According to church tradition Matthew was the first gospel that was written which is why it is put first in the New Testament so this will be a wonderful study! Later on in the month, beginning September 24th at 11:45 we will begin another Episcopal Traditions class for those who wish to become members of St. Andrews.

This summer there have been some changes. We now have a choir room and new office for our minister of music! We also have a new room for our library which will now be very visible! The conference room in Krysher Hall is now the classroom closest to the kitchen. It will also serve as the classroom for the sr/jr high students. This year the pre-kindergarten kids will be meeting in the narthex toddler room in back of the chapel. Mrs. Loa is excited about being in her new classroom. Ms. Susan will stay in her class. Unfortunately we have not started with the renovation of the sacristy yet. The contractor has had some serious health issues and we have had to delay. But it is all good! God is still in control!

If you wander into the Church Office building you will see that our Administrator, Debbie Smith has moved her office. She is now in the corner office by John Follansbee, our treasurer. The Wardens are in the corner office she vacated. Debbie and Lisa Emerson, our church secretary, have been hard at work cleaning out our old files this summer. Debbie has scanned boxes and boxes of old files so that while we still have the information it is now digital and can be stored on a computer and not in a box! Thank you Debbie for those hours of work!

One of the things that I am convinced is that it is of utmost

importance for us as Christians to serve. We need to serve God and serve others. This is an integral part of being a Christian. In our church we have a number of ways to serve. For community service we have the thrift store, the back pack ministry, the bread ministry, and the food pantry. And in the church we have areas of service like the Altar Guild, the ushers and greeters, the choir, the receptionists, the people who take care of the Memorial Garden and grounds, the Sunday School and youth group leaders/teachers, the librarians, the Daughters of the King, the music ministry, Order of St. Luke, Lay Eucharistic ministers and Pastoral team visitors, computer operators and coffee hour hostesses, prayer chain volunteers, and others as well. Right now we are in rather desperate need for people to serve in the Heartline ministry. I receive calls for help with rides every week and our current Heartline coordinator, Hank McInturff, has to step away because of health issues. We also are in great need for nursery workers during the 10:30 service. This is extremely important because when we have young families show up, if we do not have child care so that the parents are comfortable with leaving their children in care during church then they do not come back! So we need some people with a heart for children who would be willing to come to a Saturday or early Sunday service in order to stay with the children during the 10:30 service. If you are currently not serving in some way, here are two ministries where you would really make a difference!

God is working in our church and working through our church to help others. He is blessing us and guiding us as we move into this new program year. So let us keep serving Him so that St. Andrew's will continue to be light and salt in our community.

THE THURIBLE



The term "Thurible" is not a term familiar to most of us. Yet, we have one situated at the altar.

A Thurible is a metal pot on a chain, with a removable lid and air holes, in which incense is burned. The chain allows the pot to be swung gently, releasing smoke from the burning incense.

In many churches the Thurible is carried in processions and is used to cense the Gospel book before reading of the Gospel and the altar at the Offertory as part of the preparation for celebrating the Eucharist.

Incense is aromatic gum which is burned in a Thurible. Incense has been burned as part of Jewish and Christian worship since the beginning.

The burning of incense as part of the worship of God can be found in many examples of Holy Scripture as commanded by God:

Chronical 13:11 "Every morning and evening they present burnt offerings and fragrant incense to the Lord"

Exodus 30:7-9 "Aaron must burn fragrant incense every morning when he tends the lamps. He must burn incense again when he lights the lamps at twilight so incense will burn regularly before the Lord."

Luke 1:8-10 "Once when Zechariah's division was on duty and he was serving as priest before God, he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood to go into the temple of the Lord and burn incense. And when the time for the burning of incense came, all the assembled worshippers were outside praying."

Revelation 8:3-4 "Another angel, who had a golden censer, came and stood at the altar. He was given much incense to offer, with the prayers of all the saints, on the golden altar before the throne. The smoke of the incense together with the prayers of the saints went up before God from the angel's hand".

Many Episcopal churches use incense at every worship service, while others may use it only on Sunday. Some churches will only use incense on the special High Holy Feasts of the church year. Some churches use incense to enhance worship on certain Sundays, such as the first Sunday of every month.

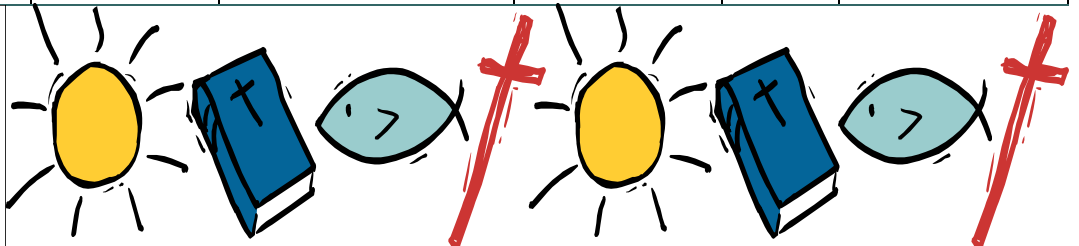
